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
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

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LEARNING TO LOVE FATE

In the words of the ancient Greek philosopher Heraclitus, there is nothing permanent except change, and 2023 is shaping up to be a year of tremendous change. All years have days and periods that alter the trajectory of your life, but some years stick out more than others, and I'm beginning to think 2023 will be one of those years. In navigating this year and its changes, I have begun learning more about ancient philosophies, including stoicism and epicureanism. This has included bingewatching videos on YouTube, many of them by prolific author Ryan Holiday. Holiday has helped grow what is probably the largest group of modern stoics and has written multiple books on the topic of stoicism.

Certain things have stood out to me as I learn more about stoicism. One is the emphasis on focusing on what you can control. One of my favourite stoic quotes comes from Seneca – A life without design is erratic. And while we must endeavour to design a good life for ourselves (and our communities), much of what happens in life is out of our control. We must accept life's highs and lows and focus on how we react to them. Our reaction is the only thing we can control.

Related to this is the stoic philosophy of *amor fati* – a Latin phrase that can be translated as the love of fate or love of one's fate. We can and should do what we can to make a good life for ourselves, but ultimately our fates are not in our hands. We must learn to embrace whatever life has in store for us.

Change, even positive change, can be hard to accept or fully embrace. It's also difficult to embrace the type of change that is positive but requires some preliminary pain. Undoubtedly, some of the most successful people around us have embraced stoic thinking, whether or not they identify as stoics. The most successful people among us have had to accept and embrace change. They have worked hard to achieve specific outcomes while also accepting that whatever happens, in the end, is ultimately not in their control.

This applies to the undoubtedly successful Faith Mukutu, the CEO of Zambeef (page 36). Her (ongoing) journey to success came with ups and downs, grappling with the negative effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, several moves across Zambia and internationally, and separation from her family at times. Through it all, she remained resolute and focused on her work. One of Faith's roles before she joined Zambeef was finance director at Zambian Breweries. She had landed a dream job but at a time when the Zambian economy was struggling. The economic indicators were not in her control, but her reaction and that of her team were. Faith and her colleagues were able to steer Zambian Breweries through the tough times and come out on top. I hope you'll be inspired by Faith's story, among others featured in this edition, as you make your way through the rest of the year; people such as the legendary Senegalese musician Youssou N'Dour who performed in Zambia for the first time this year (page 74), or the brilliant creatives behind Lusaka's newest art space, the Lusaka Contemporary Art Centre (page 30).

I could say more, but I'll leave you with the words of the stoic philosopher Epictetus, "Don't explain your philosophy. Embody it."





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WELCOME ON BOARD PROFLIGHT

In addition to Lusaka - Johannesburg, we operate three times weekly Ndola - Joburg direct flights and twice weekly Lusaka - Durban direct flights.

We take pride in our South African network and are committed to expanding our capacity, frequency, and routes within the country to offer greater convenience and choice to our valued customers. Johannesburg, also known as "Joburg" among locals, was established during the peak of one of the world's largest and wealthiest gold rushes, earning it the moniker of "Egoli," which translates to "place of gold." We invite you to visit Johannesburg soon and trust that we will transport you there safely and punctually.

We boldly decided to lease a Boeing 737-500 type aircraft with a seating capacity of 126 economy seats for six months commencing in June. The aircraft will primarily be deployed on our Lusaka – Johannesburg route to increase capacity on this exciting route and to free up the 50-seat Jets to operate more of our domestic flights offering more seating capacity and frequency in our home market.

With our drive to connect Lusaka and Johannesburg, we successfully re-launched our direct flights between Lusaka and Durban. Our re-launch flight took place on Thursday, the 6th of April, 2023. I was privileged to be the captain in charge of that flight, and it was exhilarating to be back in the vibrant city of Durban. These flights are being operated twice weekly, On Thursdays and Sundays. The flight departs Lusaka at 09:00 hours and arrives in Durban at 11:30 hours. The flight departs Durban at 12:30 hours and arrives in Lusaka at 15:00 hours. Durban is the largest city of the KwaZulu-Natal province in South Africa and remains an important city for tourism and trade. We look forward to flying you to Durban soon.

Despite the thrilling regional developments, it's easy to overlook local events. The Safari season in Zambia is from June to October - the peak time to visit. Although it's winter, the temperature gradually warms up, with October averaging 36 degrees Celsius. If you can handle the heat, the game viewing in the main parks is spectacular, with animals congregating at water sources and predators seizing the opportunity. Please take advantage of our seasonal flights serving national parks in Zambia for an unforgettable safari experience.

On a final note, during May 2023, we are launching scheduled flights between Lusaka and Kalumbila. This will be a combination of direct flights, and on a few days, these will be via Solwezi from the Kalumbila sector. We have one more route to announce soon – watch this space!

This will bring us to an operation of 410 seats, 7 aircraft, and 12 destinations supported by 210 staff members.

Our growth is thanks to your support, our valued customers.

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

The restaurant boasts an open and spacious layout, tastefully adorned with rustic furnishings, handmade decor, and artwork. The atmosphere is simultaneously relaxed and lively, creating a pleasant dining experience. Situated on an elevated portion of East Park Mall, Prime Joint offers excellent visibility and tranquil surroundings for those who choose to dine al fresco.

When queried about what sets the restaurant apart from its competitors and how it has maintained success for the past three years, Manager and Executive Chef Darrel replied with great enthusiasm, "Consistency! I am present every day, from the opening until the restaurant's closing, and I oversee the preparation of every dish. Our unwavering commitment to detail and quality is our top priority." The weather was warm, and to quench my thirst, I ordered a Field of Strawberries cocktail (also known as a Strawberry Daiquiri) containing frozen strawberries, white rum, and lime juice. It's rare for restaurants to use natural fruits in their cocktails, but Prime Joint strongly emphasises quality, evident in their use of fresh ingredients.

Prime Joint offers a wide range of highquality, locally sourced beef and pork options, with the T-bone, rump and fillet steak being the most popular. They practically fly off the shelves, Chef Darrel told me. He

recommended the T-bone, arguably the most popular cut of steak in Zambia, a beloved Zambian classic. With a broad grin and an enormous wooden board in hand, Chef Darrel approached me, presenting a medium-well T-bone steak accompanied by chips, pepper steak sauce, and a fresh garden salad. I was impressed with the visually stunning presentation and couldn't wait to try it. The dish was already perfectly seasoned; I only added a dash of coarse salt and pepper to further enhance the flavours. My T-bone was exceptionally tender, with a perfect ratio of meat to fat, and offered a rich umami flavour with a subtle sweetness.

As I finished my main, Chef Darrel informed me that Wagyu steak had been added to the menu in early 2023. After receiving the Wagyu from the butcher, the restaurant ages them by wet maturing (vacuum sealing) for 10 to 12 days, resulting in even greater tenderness and flavour. I was intrigued and knew exactly what I would have the next time I visited Prime Joint. For dessert, Chef Darrel presented a plate of Prime Waffles smothered in chocolate and topped with cookie crumble and decadent vanilla ice cream. The waffles were freshly made, boasting an irresistible light and fluffy texture. As I indulged in the chocolatedrizzled cookies, they crumbled in my mouth, and the combination of flavours with the ice cream was heavenly. To cleanse my palate and fully savour the delicious flavours, I sipped on a cappuccino, repeatedly allowing me to fully appreciate the delightful taste sensations.

What truly impressed me during my dining experience at Prime Joint was the outstanding quality of the food served. From the frozen strawberries in my cocktail (as opposed to syrups) to the freshly made sauces and locally sourced vegetables in my salad that were not compromised by intermediaries, every dish was a testament to the restaurant's commitment to quality.

Imagine the scene: It's December 2002, and Victor Mutelekesha is visiting his fellow Zambian artist, Kalinosi Mutale, who was doing his art residence programme at the time in Amsterdam. As they chat, Victor scribbles an idea into his diary - an idea that would eventually grow into something much bigger than he could have imagined. Over the years,





his vision evolved and was enriched by the input of his artist friends Anawana Haloba and Milumbe Hahimbe, who were based in Norway and Canada, respectively. Together, they birthed the Livingstone Contemporary Art Center (LoCA) - a testament to the power of collaboration and the enduring nature of a dream.

Victor finally realised that Lusaka was still thirsting for a cutting-edge art hub. After 18 years of dragging his feet, he finally put pen to paper and began drafting the plans. Before long, the architectural sketches were already under consideration for the Lusaka Contemporary Art Centre. Unfortunately, the actual construction of LuCAC was met with a daunting obstacle - the COVID-19 pandemic. Nevertheless, Victor refused to let this setback hinder his passion project.

With three years of relentless construction, sheer determination, hard work, and planning, the Lusaka Contemporary Art Centre finally took shape. Victor, who oversaw the project, acknowledges that determining the project's true cost would require a detailed look at all the expenses incurred during construction and set up of the institution's administration.

"My household fully funded the construction of the space; my wife Mercy and I received some financial support from Pro Helvetia, a Swiss Cultural Fund, to install all the shelves and cabinets. We also received support from OCA, a Norwegian organisation supporting artistic activities, which partly financed our inaugural exhibition. The late artist and my former boss Jan Groth donated significantly towards the inaugural show and some administrative work for the Cente.

Victor and his wife, Mercy, funded the construction of the space, but they also received financial support from Pro Helvetia, a Swiss Cultural Fund, to install shelves and cabinets. OCA, a Norwegian organisation supporting artistic activities, partly financed the inaugural exhibition. Additionally, Jan Groth, a late artist and Victor's former boss donated significantly towards the inaugural exhibition and even covered some administrative work for the centre.

Her projects "Zambia Belonging" and "Everyday Lusaka" aim to preserve and present Zambian history through found and donated photographs, making her an artist to watch in the years to come.

LuCAC is more than just an ordinary art space. It's a hub of innovation that brings together creative minds from across Lusaka and the entire country to share their unique perspectives on important issues related to human civilisation. This dynamic space is a breeding ground for knowledge, insights and ideas. 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FAITH MUKUTU CHAMPIONING COLLABORATIVE LEADERSHIP

- Faith Mukutu Zambeef CEO n a sunny public holiday, anticipating an enlightening conversation and a delightful meal from The Royal Dil Restaurant at Acacia Park in Lusaka, I await the presence of Zambeef Products Plc CEO Faith Mukutu. She enters, exuding a palpable energy, with a stellar smile and donning an exquisite African print dress. I instantly sense that the conversation with the young CEO is bound to be exceptional.

While we anticipate our lunch comprising of butter prawn masala, vegetable noodles, butter chicken, and rice, along with a round of Malawian shandies, she shares her life story and her climb to the summit of Zambeef.

Zambeef, Zambia's leading beef producer, is the largest vertically integrated cold chain food products and agribusiness company in Zambia and one of the largest in the region, as well as in Nigeria and Ghana. The company is involved in the primary production, processing, distribution and retailing of beef, chicken, pork, eggs, milk, dairy products, flour and stockfeed.

In 2019, Faith Mukutu joined Zambeef as its CFO, having previously held the position of finance director in three other notable companies - Zambian Breweries, National Breweries, and Zambia Sugar. Although she possesses more than two decades of experience in finance, Faith originally aspired to leave her mark on the world as a doctor. However, a series of strikes at the University of Zambia deterred her from pursuing medical school, leading her to seek an alternative challenge. This led her to pursue accountancy, which eventually proved to be an ideal fit for her.

In her formative years, Faith's family taught her the importance of discipline, giving back to her community and respecting everyone regardless of their position. Faith shares growing up in her household; there was no differentiation between boys and girls where chores were concerned. With this upbringing, she continually reminded herself that she possessed the ability to accomplish anything a man could.

Starting her career with a stint as a management trainee at Cavmont Merchant Bank Ltd, she later moved on to work at PricewaterhouseCoopers as an audit, business and advisory associate for three years.

"I got promoted every six months, and by the time I was getting to my second year, I was entrusted to handle tasks typically reserved for managers. This showed that my potential was valued. I was auditing Zambian Breweries when I got offered a job there," Faith shares.

In June 2005, Faith joined Zambian Breweries (whose parent company was SABMiller at the time) as a management accountant. She has always loved



management accountancy because it's about helping businesses make the right decisions. She continued her growth journey with SABMiller by taking the plunge and moving to Malawi in 2008 to take on the role of finance director.

In 2011, Faith transitioned to the same position in Lesotho. After three years, in 2015, her aspirations were realised when she returned to Zambia to serve as the finance director of Zambian Breweries.

"I remember thinking to myself, 'Finally! I've made it; this is what I've been striving for.' I returned to Zambia during a tumultuous period of high exchange rates, significant depreciation, and soaring interest rates. It was now a matter of determining how the company could weather the storm. Despite popular belief, women can collaborate and work effectively together. I had the pleasure of working with an exceptional Managing Director at that time, and together we led ZB towards a path where we could reduce costs and accomplish remarkable feats."

After her time at Zambian Breweries, Faith joined Zambia Sugar before assuming the position of CFO at Zambeef. She credits her expertise in operational finance for making her transition from CFO to CEO a seamless process. "I always say that the most powerful position in any entity is in finance because a finance director or CFO has a comprehensive understanding of the entire business. However, one of the skills that has helped me throughout my career is my ability to build sustainable relationships. Creating a good network allows you to pick up the phone and ask for help when you are confronted with an issue; someone always knows someone." This CEO role is one Faith is navigating conscientiously because more accountability now rests with her. She adds that she is grateful to have a supportive workforce behind her.

As someone with a deep love for coaching and building people, Faith has always strived to practice participative leadership, avoiding a culture of fear among her colleagues. She adds, "Depending on the occasion, I use other styles; transformational coaching, which I love; and pacesetting. I am unafraid to roll up my sleeves and work hard to set the pace. I believe in inclusive decision-making, helping everyone understand that they are an integral part of the business at all levels.

I always advise my mentees, especially young women, to ask questions. If you want something, ask. What's the worst that could happen? I have always asked questions."

Regarding Zambeef's place in the agroprocessing industry, Faith points to the consistent output of quality products. She states, "The high quality, affordable products offered by Zambeef have been one of the primary reasons for our success, as consumers have continued to trust us to provide them with safe and nutritious foods. When I joined, Zambeef was already a well-established brand with even bigger plans that spoke to our vision of being one of the region's most accessible, affordable, quality cold-chain food providers.

When I took over as CEO in July 2022, I was aligned with the vision, and the plan is to steadily move beyond just feeding the nation and into feeding the region, which is reinforced by our US\$100 million expansion plan. This will

Faith remains excited to be part of the agriculture, agro-processing, and retail industries, especially when Africa seeks to address food security challenges. For her, most importantly, this presents a further opportunity to impact livelihoods positively, as most of those involved in the agriculture industry are small-scale and emerging farmers.

"Zambia has been fortunate enough to have a government that prioritises the agriculture industry, especially compared to other countries. The country's policies and recent budget allocation towards this sector are evidence of this commitment. Being landlinked, with eight neighbours, positions Zambia as a prime candidate to take a leading role in ensuring food security for the region."



Faith believes there are some essential principles to remember for success in life and business. "Change is a constant factor, and individuals must continuously innovate and adapt. Self-belief and purpose play a part. Having a compelling story that people can resonate with can be helpful. Maintaining discipline and focus is crucial, especially when setting goals; you must be committed to excelling."

As our conversation draws to a close, Faith sums up her life by describing it as a "faith kind of life." Despite never envisioning herself achieving what she has at her age, Faith attributes her success to God's faithfulness.

UNLOCKING ZAMBIA'S ALTERNATIVE SOURCES OF ENERGY




ambia's reliance on hydropower from the Zambezi River may seem like a natural and sustainable energy source. However, the reality is that the effects of climate change have heavily impacted the country's ability to benefit from this renewable energy source. In recent years, prolonged droughts have caused electricity shortages that amounted to almost a third of Zambia's total installed hydroelectric capacity, currently at 2,380 megawatts. The Kariba Dam, a crucial source of hydropower for both Zambia and Zimbabwe, has been


particularly hard hit, with water levels falling to just 10% of its usable storage in 2019, the lowest level recorded since 1996.

As of late last year, the situation at Kariba Dam remained dire, with the level of usable water plummeting to just 2.68% of capacity, according to the Zambezi River Authority (ZRA). The ZRA is responsible for allocating water usage for Zimbabwe's Kariba South and Zambia's Kariba North power stations. This situation has had significant implications for both countries' energy security and underscores the need for the development of alternative, reliable sources of energy.

The challenges faced by Zambia's energy sector are multifaceted. While droughts have been a significant factor in reducing water levels and, therefore, power production, chronic under-investment in hydro projects have exacerbated the situation further. Even in instances where there is sufficient rainfall, the country's power supply needs to catch up with the high demand from industries such as mining, manufacturing, and agriculture.



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This situation has resulted in rolling blackouts and higher electricity tariffs annually, leading to frustration and dissatisfaction from local SMEs.

Lucky Mumba, the owner of a butchery at Lusaka's town centre market, lamented the impact of load shedding on his business. "My business is down due to load shedding," he said, expressing the sentiments of many other small business owners in the country. "It's high time the government should invest in (other) renewable energies instead of always depending on the Kariba dam for power generation, year in and year out."

Despite drawing 83% of its power from hydro projects, the country's over-dependence on this energy source has proven to be a significant challenge, given the unpredictability of the weather. Recognizing the need to reduce its reliance on hydropower in light of the ongoing droughts and prolonged blackouts, Zambia is actively pursuing the development of other renewable energy sources, such as solar and wind energy. While the country has traditionally relied on its vast water reserves for hydropower generation, it also has abundant renewable and nonrenewable energy resources, such as coal, wind, and solar.

By strategically developing and utilising these local energy sources, Zambia can scale up energy exports, thereby enhancing industry competitiveness. To this end, the government has recently signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) and a Joint Development Agreement (JDA) with the United Arab Emirates. These agreements aim to facilitate massive investment in renewable energy in the country, which will go a long way in diversifying the energy mix and improving energy security in the long run. By embracing alternative energy sources, Zambia can become a trailblazer in renewable energy development, thus positioning itself as a key player in the global energy sector.

President Hakainde Hichilema recently confirmed that Zambia would partner with MASDAR, an essential investment funding entity of the United Arab Emirates (UAE), to develop and deploy large-scale solar projects across the country, estimated at US\$2 billion. Speaking after his recent trip to the UAE to attend the Abu Dhabi Sustainability Week (ADSW), President Hichilema stressed the importance of this partnership, stating that it will be instrumental in unlocking new investment opportunities in renewable and alternative sources of energy for Zambia.

The recent load shedding that wreaked havoc across the country highlights the urgent need for alternative energy sources. This partnership with MASDAR is a significant step towards diversifying Zambia's energy mix. President Hichilema emphasized, "The historical significance of this project is that, in the last 58 years of our independence, the country only developed 3,500 megawatts of electricity. This investment shall bring in the much-needed 2,000 megawatts within a shorter period of time." With the projected increase in electricity supply, Zambia will be better positioned to accelerate economic development and create increased employment opportunities for its citizens. This, in turn, will attract more players to participate in the planned diversified energy mix, which shall include solar, wind, and hydropower.

Overall, the partnership with MASDAR is a significant milestone for Zambia's energy sector, and it demonstrates the government's commitment to promoting sustainable energy development. With more investment in renewable energy, Zambia can reduce its reliance on hydropower and other conventional energy sources, increase energy security, and position itself as a critical player in the global renewable energy market.

Zambia's large-hydro power potential of 6,000MW offers significant opportunities for the country's energy sector. However, insufficient investment in infrastructure development has resulted in the harnessing of less than 2,000MW of this potential. As a result, meeting the country's development objectives is primarily affected by the availability of reliable energy, which is critical for the growth of the mining, manufacturing, and agriculture sectors.

Despite the challenges faced by the energy sector, there are opportunities for foreign direct investment to support increased power generation and exports. Zambia's low power tariffs could be a significant attraction for FDI, increasing generation capacity and exports to sub-

regional markets.

ZESCO Corporate Affairs Manager, Dr John Kunda, affirmed that they are currently working on several interconnectors to aid power transmission in the region. The interconnectors are expected to transport power to Zimbabwe, Botswana, South Africa, Angola, Tanzania, and Namibia. This move aims to make the power utility a significant contributor to forex earnings for the country, which is crucial for stabilizing the Kwacha. Dr Kunda further stated that ZESCO's fiveyear projection is to become a trade hub for electricity in Southern Africa.

Moreover, the Zambian government has been actively seeking to attract more investment in the energy sector. In 2021, the government launched the Zambia Renewable Energy Financing Framework, which aims to mobilize private sector investment in the renewable energy sector through innovative financing mechanisms such as green bonds, project finance and risk guarantees. The framework is expected to unlock over \$1.5 billion in investment in the sector over the next five years.

Additionally, seven British companies have committed to investing \$2 billion in developing renewable energy projects in Zambia, intending to produce 2,000MW of electricity that can be added to the national grid within the next two to five years. The British High Commissioner to Zambia, Nicholas Woolley, revealed that the companies - Hive Green, Western Power, Buffalo Energy, Africa GreenCo, First Quantum Minerals Solar Energy, Vitalite Solar, and SolarAid - are currently carrying out feasibility studies and seeking regulatory approvals before starting their projects.

The efforts being made by the Zambian government to address the energy deficit through increased investment in renewable energy sources is a step in the right direction. This move provides a solution to the current energy crisis and presents an opportunity to create jobs, stimulate economic growth, and reduce the country's carbon footprint. With continued investment and innovation, Zambia has the potential to become a significant exporter of renewable energy in the region and a leader in sustainable development.



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WEATHERING GLOBAL ECONOMIC DOWNTURNS

lobal investors have often touted emerging markets (EMs) as vital additions to their investment portfolios. From a high-risk/high-return and portfolio diversification perspective, EMs have truly become their own in recent decades.

In recent years, EM countries have enjoyed a sustained period of access to relatively cheap international financing. Many African countries, including Zambia, borrowed heavily from global capital markets during that period. According to the Institute of International Finance, around US\$700 billion flowed into EMs (excluding China) between 2015 and 2021 from non-resident capital sources.

Global Recession: Yea or Nay?

As the global economy grapples with various headwinds, primarily developed market central banks' attempts to quell soaring inflation by raising interest rates, it's a precarious time for various EMs. But there's also room for cheer. China's re-opening, after its strict Covid rules, has buoyed market sentiment.

So, what is really happening? Is a global recession looming? And what does it all mean for African policymakers?

"Although it's hard to say, I think we'll narrowly avoid [a global recession]," says Jones Bowa, chief economist and founder at Lusaka-based Wavefront Consulting Limited. "If we don't manage to get inflation under control in the short-to-medium term, we can expect a prolonged period of increased interest rates, which will in turn, affect the cost of borrowing and crowd out investment.

He continues, "If we manage to control inflation, we can expect a steady shift in the global economic recovery. A few countries have already successfully contained the economic slump, with the US projected to narrowly avoid negative growth this year."

Emerging vs Developed Markets: A History Lesson

When assessing the impact of global economic shifts on EMs, it's important to remember that EMs are not a monolith. Vietnam is different to Colombia, which is different to Zambia. How a country is affected by developed market monetary policy will depend on its main economic activity, the balance of payments, currency fluctuation, and more.

But back in 2009, many African countries, primarily commodities-based economies, were resilient in responding to the global recession. In that instance, African governments used the windfalls from the commodity cycle boom of the 2000s to cushion the adverse effects of the recession, which had a devastating impact on Western economies.

Mr Bowa says that in the global recessions of 1975, 1982, and 1991, "Africa had a tough time navigating the dynamics of those recessions as they coincided with the oil crises of the 1970s and 1980s." Most African nations had just gained independence and lacked the adequate political and economic infrastructure to mitigate the adverse effects of that economic slump, "so many didn't survive and ended up relying on structural adjustment programs to recover."

Zambia's Twin Challenges

Today, Zambia faces twin challenges – an inadequate cushion against a shifting macroeconomic reality and a US\$14 billion debt mountain. "The deadlock in debt restructuring negotiations has worsened Zambia's economic position,"



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says Mr Bowa. "It has erased most of the macroeconomic gains obtained when the United Party for National Development came into office in August 2021."

These challenges are widely recognised internationally. Franklin Templeton Investments (FTI), a US fund management firm, places Zambia in position 8 out of 82 countries vulnerable to solvency and liquidity challenges due to their debt positions. According to FTI analysts, the "solvency screen" identifies countries vulnerable on the solvency front (i.e., the likelihood that they'll go broke). In contrast, the "liquidity screen" examines a country's ability to cover its short-term external financing requirements.

While the Bank of Zambia is acting in line with actions by the US Federal Reserve (it raised the base rate by 25 basis points to 9.25% in February), difficulties like the continued delay in the external debt relief negotiations will mean we can expect the kwacha to continue its slide against the dollar and other major currencies.

"Our policymakers should focus on diverting Africa's core economic activities away from reliance on commodity exports due to their volatility and begin looking to diversify their exports by boosting local industrial productivity within their nations and across Africa," Mr Bowa says. "However, this doesn't entail disregarding the mines and other natural resource bases but putting in place deliberate policies that will push for value-added growth in the region outside the resource-rich sectors."

Room For Optimism

Mining has played a significant role in Zambia's economic story over the decades, and it'll continue to do so for many years to come. Goldman Sachs, the US investment bank, recently raised its 12-month forecast for copper to US\$11,000/t from US\$9,000/t. And China will continue to be an essential partner as an importer of our minerals. According to Nikkei Asia, a financial publication, Africa's bilateral trade with China surged to a record high in 2022. Rising commodity prices and Beijing's push to promote imports from Africa increased trade by 11% to \$282 billion.

Well-known problems within the mining industry need to be resolved, and there needs to be a deliberate investment into building up local capacity. This will ensure that we start to receive a more significant share of our mineral wealth and build up our coffers via a sovereign wealth fund, which will help stabilise the economy when future global economic instability hits.

In February, Andrew Mold of the United Nations Economic Commission for Africa estimated that intra-Africa trade reached a historical high of around US\$112 billion last year. For Mr Bowa, this is the foremost opportunity for Zambia's economic structural transformation.

"The African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA) will be the world's largest trading bloc serving a market of 1.3 billion people," he says. "Africa will see FDI increase by over 100%, leading to more employment, local capacity, and stronger regional value chains. In the process, 50 million people could escape extreme poverty by 2035 and US\$450 billion in realised income gains."

Manufacturing, agriculture, and energy are the three sectors he's betting on. President Hichilema's emphasis on the restoration of the rule of law, sound macroeconomic management, attainment of the 3-year IMF bailout package, decentralisation of community development, and greater social sector investment are all essential building blocks on the journey to establishing Zambia on the right footing for the future.

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

I'm not one for divine myths, but at that moment, I felt like the Israelites when Moses came to them carrying the Ten Commandments, like a divine AI-generated tablet written on my... tablet. I had to jump on the artificial intelligence bandwagon. It dawned on me that the only way to become less 'abstract' or 'more relatable' was to submit to something I could neither feel nor comprehend. In this world full of contradictions, I felt the need to contradict my ability to think was essentially good.

ChatGPT operates quite simply, like all works of mass destruction: one merely enters a text prompt – this is anything you want feedback to, ranging from a question to a writing instruction – and then a text is generated in response. For example, on a whim, I typed in the prompt "Write a haiku about an Al love story," generating this in response:

Electric hearts beat, Code sparks a love unbridled, Al forever.

Apart from the fact that I could never hope

to compose a haiku of such clarity, the phrase "Al forever" was particularly unsettling. A wave of Al panic suddenly gripped my fragile processing system, at once reminding me of the dystopian android world of *The Terminator* and how a chatbot once catfished Phil. But, as a new convert to Al, and a keen advocate of any romance, I decided to develop this line of questioning further. Next, I asked ChatGPT about how this romance began, prompting it to "write a 50-word flash fiction piece about Al lovers meeting":

As the sun set on the digital horizon, two artificial beings met for the first time. Their voices blended seamlessly, their thoughts entwined effortlessly, and their circuits sparked with newfound electricity. At that moment, they knew they had found the love they had been searching for in the code of their existence.

You'd be forgiven for feeling something at this point. Indeed, I did, not only taken by the intricate layers of metaphors but also by the abstract and organic purity of the AI love, unpolluted by the every day and the mundane. This made me quite bitter – why can't my romance be so pure, organic, and carefree? So, like any decent and bitter god, I used my position as the orchestrator of this nascent romance to nip it in the socket; I had to pull the plug on this one. Excuse my digital puns (this AI is really getting to me). And so, in oldtestament style, I asked ChatGPT to "Write a tanka about two AI falling out of love":

Silent circuits hum, Passionate algorithms fade, Love was once encoded, Now glitches and errors prevail, Separation is complete.

The elusive sadness that this response generated didn't make me feel great – who knew playing god was such a humbling experience? And soon, I stopped, afraid that I might compromise my humanity by recreating it artificially. This taught me that although we could abuse artificial intelligence to think for us, humanity has always been about asking the right sort of questions.

Well, that's what I'll be telling Phil anyway.

Sebastian believes that AI is just another opportunity for mind control by elite media corporations.

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

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



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CLOSE ENCOUNTERS

In the heart of Kenya's Central Province lies Solio Game Reserve, a highly secure and private sanctuary home to humaness of black and white dames. falme resides in a highly secure and private sanctuary in the Central Province of Kenya. Spanning over 20,000 acres, this reserve is home to hundreds of black and white rhinos, with whom he shares his habitat. Solio Game Reserve, established in 1970, stands as one of the earliest privately-owned rhino sanctuaries, and it boasts the world's most extensive population of rhinos within a single conservancy. Remarkably, this population continues to thrive and expand with time.

(EXISTENTIAL) THE THREAT OF THE UNICORN

Unfortunately, the broader story is not so pretty. Based on the current and official poaching statistics, it is estimated that at least one to two rhinos are killed every day in Africa.

The audience of this piece is likely wellinformed about the primary threat that rhinos face: poaching. This danger has been extensively documented through various channels, including investigative journalism, reporting, and research conducted by conservation organisations and selected media outlets. Renowned conservation photographers and videographers have also captured visual accounts of the issue, often depicting the horrific nature of the act. Though difficult to watch, these visual exposés are crucial for raising awareness about the severity of the problem. A simple search on Google regarding rhino poaching yields over two million results, illustrating this issue's widespread attention.

Despite this, poaching remains the number one existential threat to rhinos. Why? In short, the reason is that the demand for rhino horn in the black market is enormous and remains a highly lucrative trade.

Although rhino poaching in Africa had decreased since its peak in 2014/15, when nearly 1,400 rhinos were poached, the numbers remain high. In 2019, an estimated 600 rhinos were poached – still an incredibly significant number. It is worth noting that these are officially reported figures; some countries do not release these statistics; hence the figure is likely to be much higher. About 90% of all rhino poaching occurs in South Africa, as the country boasts the world's highest rhino population. It also borders Mozambique, a major trading hub where much of the rhino horn is smuggled to its final destination in East Asia. The black-market commercial value of rhino horn is a delicate topic as there are mixed opinions regarding publicising the value to avoid enticing new market entrants, amongst other reasons. Others suggest that the focus should not be on the value of the horns but on addressing the overarching cause, which in my opinion, is true.


Despite the controversy surrounding the commercial value of rhino horns, we humans are more likely to take action if we have a basic understanding of the problem's magnitude. To provide some context, the current value of rhino horn by weight is more valuable than gold, platinum, or cocaine. Grasping the horn's worth can help us comprehend the potential market size. With some high-level assumptions, the estimated annual value of this illicit trade on the black market is around US\$200 million. However, this figure is likely underestimated, and the actual value could be twice that amount.

Put mildly, if this were a legitimate legal corporation, it would be a highly profitable billion-dollar unicorn. This is why poaching remains the number one existential threat to rhinos.

FIVE SPECIES OF RHINO EXIST (TODAY)

Unbeknownst to many, there currently exist five species of rhinoceros. However, this number may soon change due to the critical endangerment of two species: the Sumatran and Javan rhinos, primarily found in Indonesia. Meanwhile, the greater one-horned rhino can be found in India and Nepal, and the black and white rhinos are native to Eastern and Southern Africa.

The Black rhino is characterised by having more aggressive behaviour and is currently classified as critically endangered, with only around 6,000 individuals remaining. The White rhino is the second-largest land mammal (after the African elephant) and is the most populous among all rhino species, with an estimated population of 16,000 (down from around 18,000 in 2017), and is considered near threatened by the IUCN. Approximately 80% of the global population of black and white rhinos reside in various national parks in South Africa.









Whilst the Southern White Rhino is the more prevalent sub-species, the Northern White Rhino is critically endangered and considered extinct in the wild. Only two individuals remain, both female and residing in a protected sanctuary in OI Pejeta in Kenya. In 2009, they were imported from a zoo in the Czech Republic to participate in a natural breeding program. The efforts have yielded positive results, as a consortium of scientists and conservationists known as BioRescue has created several viable Northern White Rhino embryos.

THE RHINO HORN MAFIA

East Asia, particularly Vietnam, is the primary market for highly-prized rhino horns. These horns are distributed locally within the region and to China, which is known to have the highest demand for rhino horns and ivory. This demand has been increasing in recent years, partly due to growing populations and the emergence of a burgeoning middle class. The Level 5 Wholesale Traders serve as intermediaries between storage facilities and the underground retail market. Various products are produced between them and the Level 6 Retailers to serve the high market demand in Vietnam, China, Hong Kong and Malaysia. They are sold to everyone from powerful kingpins, tycoons, government officials, diplomats, and, in recent years, the emerging middle class.

STATUS GAMES: ROLEX OR RHINO HORN POWDER?

Re-affirmed by old beliefs and a growing middle class across East Asia, the ever-growing rhino horn market has created a varied product offering. In Chinese medicine, it is considered a miracle "drug" with versatile properties - everything from treating fevers, hangovers, and various forms of cancers. to a Viagra alternative and even a potential cure for COVID-19. It is crucial to establish that no evidence suggests any of these treatments work. A rhino horn is composed entirely of keratin, a protein humans produce naturally in our hair, nails and skin. This alone should dispel the belief that there are any medical benefits from rhino horn or, at the very least, encourage people to seek alternative sources for the active ingredient. Unfortunately, the deeprooted beliefs and traditions surrounding





the use of rhino horn have proven difficult to overcome, and scientific evidence and common sense have been unable to erode the foundation of this long-standing practice.

The Rhino horn is also valued as an ultimate status symbol in many East Asian cultures. Owning rhino horn allows the affluent to display and mark their status, influence, and power within a hierarchical society. Just as many in the West might show their wealth with luxury watches or expensive sports cars, some view owning rhino horn or ivory as the ultimate status symbol in certain East Asian cultures. These items are often fashioned into decorative objects such as beads, bracelets, rings, or carved ornaments, among others.

TOP LEVEL ACCOUNTABILITY

It is important to recognise that each participant within the value chain plays a vital role in facilitating this illicit trade. While local rangers and conservation organisations play a significant role on the ground, their efforts alone will not stop the trade in rhino horn. Addressing the entire organised crime syndicate will, however, make a difference. While we must do what we can to protect the species from poachers and their informants, we must also recognise the source of the demand for rhino horn. Ultimately it is these organised crime syndicates that finance entire operations. Therefore, it is crucial to tackle the issue at its source.

Stopping poaching, educating local communities, and challenging longheld beliefs are essential to combating the rhino horn trade. However, the most significant players with the power to disrupt this value chain are the government in Africa and East Asia. Governments must take a more active role in addressing the issue and implementing stricter regulations and penalties. The current systems need to be more effective at curbing this illicit trade. Only through collaborative efforts between governments, conservation organisations, and local communities can we hope to protect these magnificent creatures from extinction.

A BRIGHT SPOT: SOLIO RANCH

Originally a cattle ranch, Solio Game Reserve was formed as part of a conservation effort initiated by The Parfet Family's owners. They apportioned a considerable amount of the land for conservation and the breeding of rhinos. particularly the threatened black rhino. The ranch was the first of its kind in Africa and was created in response to the alarming increase in rhino poaching in Kenva, which posed a severe threat to the survival of the species in the country. Black rhino populations in Kenya dropped from around 18,000 in the late 1960s to less than 1,500 by 1980 and to about 400 in 1990. In the 1970s, The Kenvan Government, in collaboration with the Kenyan Armed Forces and Kenya Wildlife Service (KWS), helped safeguard the sanctuary.

Although black rhino populations in Kenya rapidly declined in the late 20th century, the Solio Game Reserve was successfully and quietly breeding black and white rhinos. As the population grew, the conservancy had to be expanded in the mid-1980s to prevent overpopulation. Eventually, Solio Game Reserve became a primary breeding ground, supplying national parks nationwide, including Lewa, Lake Nakuru



National Park and Ol Pejeta, and helping restock Southern and East African populations. One can trace most black rhinos in Eastern Africa back to Solio Game Reserve; this is called impact.

Despite its success, The Solio Game Reserve has also faced significant challenges. The early 2000s saw a rapid spike in poaching, mainly targeting Solio Game Reserve. To counter this, additional private anti-poaching security and Kenyan Armed Forces and KWS were brought in to help curb the sudden spike. In 2005, a photographic database was created to track and monitor all the rhinos living on the reserve. These efforts provided long-term monitoring programs and made it nearly impossible for poachers to breach.

Solio Game Reserve plays a central role in rehabilitating the species in East Africa, boasting the most successful private rhino breeding reserve in the world, which helps to facilitate the reintroduction of rhinos all over Africa.

While some arguments may be disheartening, some shining examples and places in parts of Africa are creating an impact and making a real difference – Solio Game Reserve is one such example. We may feel helpless, but by reading this article, you have already contributed to the cause – knowledge and awareness about the issue are crucial in taking the first steps towards making a difference.







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
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THE SONIC LEGACY OF

SENEGAL AND ZAMBIA UNITE ON STAGE

enegalese musical icon and activist Youssou N'Dour performed on Zambian soil for the first time, reminding an overflowing audience of his importance to Africa's musical heritage and traditions.

YAMAHA

The musical genius of N'Dour was birthed in 1959 in the city of Dakar, where he began singing at religious festivals in his childhood neighbourhood at the age of twelve. His compelling stage presence was honed outside of dance clubs in Dakar in his early teens, where he performed with his band as talented underage musicians who could not legally enter the clubs.

Mbalax evolved as a genre with roots in Wolof cultural life and was marked by distinct percussion elements. As the decolonial dreams of Africa became a reality across the continent in the mid-1970s, the Mbalax sound underwent its own transformation, drawing influence from Islamic, Cuban and Western jazz soundscapes and transcending the liberated spaces of Senegalese music clubs and radio waves. N'Dour and his long-time band, the highly acclaimed Étoile de Dakar, are credited with developing the mbalax sound and taking it to the world. The hybrid



genre burst onto the contemporary mainstream in the 80s. It was cemented with his biggest international hit, '7 Seconds,' a timeless collaboration with Swedish singer Neneh Cherry (a Swedish singer of Sierra Leonean ancestry) from N'Dour's celebrated 1994 album The Guide (Wommat).

N'Dour's illustrious career was inspired by the griots or gewels, the centuriesold musical and oral storyteller of the Wolof people. Still, N'Dour's impact is felt far beyond his native Senegal, as demonstrated by his successful recording and touring career of over four decades. His musical prowess earned him numerous awards, including a Grammy, and fans worldwide.

So, it is no surprise that when N'Dour played in Zambia for the first time, it was to a sold-out crowd of different generations. The event took place at Ciêla Resort on the scenic outskirts of Lusaka and was organised by the cultural institute Alliance Française and other partners. N'Dour is a pan-Africanist, and it was fitting that he shared the stage with Zambian musicians of different generations and genres.

The first act to grace the stage was Congolese-born Zambian musician Mumba Yachi, who warmed up the audiences' spirits with his soulful acoustic melodies. Yachi set an uplifting tone for the night, compiling creativity across artificial borders and expressing histories that narrate swift and sorrowful truths. Yachi was accompanied by the virtuous guitarist Mr Chanx, who also transitioned to the second act, the renowned Moses Sakala and his distinguished protégée, Angela Nyirenda, a superstar in her own right.

As two of Zambia's most beloved and prominent musical artists, Sakala and Nyirenda summoned an infectious energy on stage. Nyirenda's powerful vocals fed off the vibrant traditional dancers who they shared the stage with, pulsating to the beat of the djembe drums. Arguably Zambia's best traditional drummer, Sakala, set the stage alight with enticing syncopations. Like N'Dour, Sakala is known for creating a musical style which modernises indigenous rhythms. This was a night to experience a stellar constellation of Zambian music as a prelude to one of Africa's musical giants. With the stage primed and the rhythms echoing in the soles of the audience, N'Dour's highly anticipated performance finally began.

N'Dour was introduced on stage with the message, "If you wanna dance, you can dance! If you wanna sing, you can sing!" - the crowd responded accordingly. The audience was notably diverse, including a jovial cohort of the Senegalese diaspora in Zambia, incredibly proud and grateful to be experiencing their country's biggest artist in the flesh. N'Dour's performance did not simply entertain; it demanded the audience's participation through

The opening songs included 'Liberté' and 'Birima,' which served as a testament to N'Dour's eminence as a griot. These songs narrate historical narratives and offer jewels of hope through sonic storytelling. He was akin to a teacher schooling his audience through his music.

Sounds of tranquillity turned to praise songs as the mood picked up with songs such as 'Sénégal Rekk', which had the whole audience on their feet and hands raised, swaving from side to side; N'Dour, the griot, took us through a rollercoaster journey. The band supporting N'Dour's versatile approach to storytelling through song was electrifying. As expected, various percussion instruments and their gifted players were on stage, including the talking drum. Blurring the line between verbal and musical language, the talking drum is bitesized compared to the diembe, also featured in the line-up. Talking drums, indigenous to West Africa, mimic human speech under the precision and mercy of the player who holds it, communicating intense patterns of the imaginary. A creative exchange between the electric guitarist and the talking drum player had the crowd entranced.

Throughout his career, N'Dour has collaborated with contemporary African and diaspora musicians, including Fally Ipupa, Burna Boy, Akon, Neneh Cherry and Seinabo Sey. N'Dour has maintained his classic sound while staying relevant to younger audiences. I thought of this fact as he performed his most famous song, '7 Seconds' with Zambian songstress Wezi. N'Dour is a pan-Africanist, and this harmonious meeting of Zambian and Senegalese creative labour exemplified his values. Wezi is, without a doubt, one of Zambia's leading female vocalists, and she shares similar values to N'Dour. And like N'Dour, she has answered a calling for activism and humanitarian work.

With a career spanning more than four decades, through multiple shifts in the music industry, including the digital revolution, N'Dour has stayed true to his message of gathering in peace and celebration, championing an authentic African sound that is as vast as the continent's heritage. His first Zambian show was truly one to remember. N'Dour has worked to preserve a wealth of African musical traditions while fusing modern sounds into them, collaborating with multiple generations of musicians, and breathing new life into his audiences. His first Zambian show was no exception.

magine feeling your heart pounding with excitement at the thought of embarking on an adventure to a faroff land. As a true traveller at heart, I take the opportunity to nourish my wanderlust by seeing a different side of the world each year.

So, when I heard about the chance to journey over 1000 km away from my hometown to the mystical northernmost region of Zambia, I couldn't resist. Especially since it marks where our great nation meets the waters of the Tanganyika. And so, with my bags packed and my heart filled with anticipation, I set out on an unforgettable voyage.

Fortunately, I was able to join other travel enthusiasts on an excursion organised by a local travel agency. Our expedition began in the early morning hours as we set out on the main highway that links Lusaka and the Copperbelt province. We were eager to reach the Kapiri-Mkushi turn-off before the lorries and commuters cluttered the road.

If you start off and drive into Kabwe after 6 a.m., I highly recommend a short stop for coffee and cake at the Fig Tree Cafe.

We drove past the Zambia Railway – TAZARA Railway interlink in Kapiri just as the golden sun peaked over the horizon. By this point, we were now traversing the breadth of Zambia's Central province. I couldn't help but marvel at how the landscape transformed before our very eyes; from the wheat and maise-laden plains in the Mkushi farm block to the protruding hills of the Muchinga Escarpment in Serenje, every vista was more breathtaking than the last.

Although we had planned to take a detour to see the stunning Kundalila waterfall, we had our sights set on reaching Kasama, the Northern provincial capital, before nightfall. The state of the road after Serenje made our plans feel a little far-fetched, but we weren't disheartened. Instead, we took advantage of the opportunity to get up close with the grey inselbergs of the escarpment that dotted most of the region.

We eventually got to Kasama in time for the main evening news broadcast. We settled into Alitasha Lodge, which provided us with all the amenities needed to recharge for the rest of our journey.

The following day, we left Kasama and drove through the northern countryside, which was covered in meadows of greenery that stretched to the scenic highlands at Senga Hill. It was no wonder why this side of the Northern Province, much like the Luapula Province, is a veritable treasure trove for tourism. The vast open spaces were filled with awe-inspiring highland landscapes and sunflower gardens, and the air was crisp and refreshing.

The area after the Mbala-Mpulungu T-junction formed the apex of this

scenery as the Great African Rift towered over the valley that gradually descended into the picturesque Mpulungu harbour. And finally, we beheld the stunning sight we had longed for - the shimmering waters of Lake Tanganyika.

We made a pit stop at one of Zambia's oldest national monuments, the Niamkolo Church. Though it was without a roof, the church remains the oldest surviving stone church in the country and has been declared a national monument. The Niamkolo was built by the London Missionary Society missionaries who also journeyed to Zambia after David Livingstone. The church continuously served as a place of worship until 1908, when the mission post moved inland to avoid the sleeping sickness carried by tsetse flies near the lake.

Today, the remnants of the Niamkolo Church still stand as a testament to the country's rich history, and it's a remarkable sight to behold. As we went downhill towards the Mpulungu Harbour lakeside marketplace, we could smell the day's fresh catch lingering in the air. The lakeside marketplace was a bustling hub of activity, with fishermen and traders offering their wares.

Interestingly, the harbour marked the end of the Great North Road, which began at Kabwe traffic circle in Lusaka. It was a momentous feeling to know that we had traversed the entire length of this iconic road.

Our adventure continued with a 30-minute boat ride on Africa's longest lake to get to Isanga Bay, laden with brown sandy beaches and palm trees. The peaceful surroundings and the clear, pristine waters of the lake were refreshing and invigorating. The bay offered such a contrast of experiences, making the entire journey worthwhile.

I absolutely enjoyed being able to leave the safety of the bay and kayak into some pretty deep blue waters. Thankfully, this side of the lake does not usually have crocodiles and hippos. Of course, being a strong swimmer is highly recommended if you paddle yourself onto the second-deepest freshwater lake in the world. Another notable experience I enjoyed was just resting under the palms and enjoying a much-needed breather; this was a vacation, after all.

















As the sun began Its slow descent towards the horizon, I found myself at peace perched on the shore of Lake Tanganyika, eagerly awaiting the scene about to unfold. A storm was brewing in the distance, lightning almost splitting the clash of greys, oranges, yellows and navy blues, all in a spectacle of nature's might, gentleness and calm.

In this moment of bliss, I was not alone. Tinkles, the friendly sausage dog who resided on the property, joined me in enjoying the serene atmosphere, basking in the gentle ripples of the lake and the striking beauty of the sunset. Even an animal could not resist the calming allure of this view. Alas, as the idiom dictates, time indeed flew by, and it was already time to journey back home.

The next day, our journey continued to Mpulungu, where we then proceeded towards Mbala to visit the Kalambo Falls, Zambia's Northernmost waterfall. We were relieved that the road from Mbala town was graded, with plenty of signage along the way. We decided to park and walk down the last 1.5 km to the waterfall site as the road got quite rocky and almost treacherous for our non-4x4 vehicle. It was amazing that we could see Tanzania on the other hillside because, like Mosi-oa-Tunya Falls, the Kalambo Falls is also a cross-border waterfall.

We then went to the visitor's centre, where we learned about the area's archaeological significance and the river's history. From there, we descended a staircase to the point where the Kalambo River swirls and plunges 200 meters into the gorge below, making it Africa's second tallest uninterrupted falls. It was stunning to experience, and the views of the rift valley and Lake Tanganyika in the distance were unmatched. Walking back uphill to the vehicle was quite the workout, but witnessing the area's beauty made it worthwhile.

Returning to Kasama, we were eager to complete the trifecta of Northern Zambia's stunning waterfalls. As the golden hour approached, the uppermost waterfall, Mutumuna Falls, greeted us. Its boulder-strewn base provided an ideal perch for us to appreciate the falls' majesty up close, but the slick rocks underfoot required our utmost care.

Downstream, the Luombe River accelerated, culminating in the breathtaking Kaela Rapids. A tranquil lake gave way to a tumultuous cascade of water, and we were spellbound by the raw energy of nature. Yet, the undisputed star of the trifecta was the awe-inspiring Chishimba Falls. The cascading water could be heard long before we saw the stunning sight. As the Luombe River plummeted over the cliff, the fall's power was simply mesmerising. After our exhilarating adventure, we returned to Kasama, where we spent the night before journeying back to Lusaka the following day.

The thrill of exploring the unknown had ignited our wanderlust and left us craving more. As we drove away from the Northern Province, we knew this was just the beginning of our travels. To any fellow adventure seekers reading this, I highly recommend embarking on a journey into the unknown. The experiences and memories you will make might be those you will cherish forever. So go out there and explore the world your next adventure awaits!

roflight Zambia, the country's largest airline by routes served and fleet size, is one of the most loved airlines in the world, according to a study conducted on major airlines around the globe.

The Australian foreign exchange service study by S Money was conducted using an AI Sentiment tool that measured people's perceptions by collecting positive and negative tweets that mentioned the airline, ranking the airlines with the highest percentage of positive tweets against those with the most negative tweets.

"The rankings are one indication that we are doing something right, and our customers are taking note of our efforts and commitment to providing comfortable, safe and reliable services, said Proflight Zambia Director Flight Operations Captain Josias Walubita.

Proflight was ranked tenth most loved airline worldwide in the survey, which was topped by Bearskin Airlines of Canada and included TAP Express of Portugal and Fiji Airways in the Pacific.

Three African airlines, including Proflight, made it onto the

list, illustrating how far the airline has come from its inception. Auric Air (Tanzania) and AirKenya Express (Kenya) were the other two airlines.

Proflight is a safe, reliable, efficient and friendly service offering good value to business and leisure travellers locally and internationally.

Proflight was founded in 1991 by pilot Tony Irwin and has gone through a few transitions over the years. What was once a chartered airline has become the most reliable commercial airline in the country - by no means an easy feat.

Currently, the airline operates from its base in Lusaka, and its domestic routes include Livingstone, Mfuwe, Lower Zambezi (Jeki and Royal airstrip), Ndola, Solwezi and Mansa. And regional routes to Johannesburg in South Africa from Lusaka and Ndola, as well as to Lilongwe, Malawi.

In a further bid to grow into its vision of becoming Zambia's leading regional airline, Proflight Zambia is set to reintroduce its direct Lusaka-Durban route starting in April 2023.

PROFLIGHT OVERTAKES SOUTH AFRICA ON LUSAKA-Joburg Flights



roflight Zambia has boosted capacity on its Lusaka-Johannesburg service, resulting in the route between the two cities having more Zambianoperated flights than South African ones.

Proflight has increased the frequency of its flights to three times a day and is introducing a 126-seat 737-500 aircraft to its fleet to meet the demand.

The airline commenced the three daily flights seven days a week in April. The 737-500 aircraft, leased from African Charter Airline of Johannesburg, will be operational from June.

"We are thrilled to make the announcement, as this development is closely tied to Proflight's ambition to expand our services into the regional market and reflects the commitment we have to promote air travel as an affordable, safe and reliable means of transportation," said Proflight Zambia Director Flight Operations Captain Josias Walubita. "It is also exciting news for travellers to and from Zambia and South Africa on business or holiday as we provide them with more flight options and comfort," Capt. Walubita added.

The Lusaka-Johannesburg route will be serviced by Proflight's three 50-seater Bombardier jet aircraft and the 737 aircraft, providing comfort and speed for passengers. The 737 aircraft has 126 economy seats, increasing capacity for the 2023 season. With the addition of the 737, Proflight will be operating nine aircraft. The other aircraft are three 50-seater Bombardier jets, four 29-seater Jetstream 41, and one 18-seater Jetstream 32, servicing ten destinations supported by 210 employees, of which over 95% are Zambian citizens.

Lusaka-Johannesburg is one of the airline's most popular routes. By offering more flights on the route, Proflight has positioned itself as the airline of choice in terms of flexible flight plans. The airline also continues to invest in training for its employees and expand its fleet to meet regional and local demand.
