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#### **WANDERLUST CHRONICLES**

"Travel writers are writing history." These were the words of Mulenga Kapwepwe at the start of a travel writing workshop I recently attended. Ms Kapwepwe is, among many other things, a co-founder of the Women's History Museum of Zambia, the organisation that had organised for myself and 11 other women travel writers to attend a multi-day workshop in the picturesque Lower Zambezi. Ms Kapwepwe's words stayed with me even after the workshop ended.

Travel writing is not just lighthearted fluff pieces (though they do have their place and time). It is a personal history but also a history of the places we visit. It has the power to shape our collective understanding of the world, of places near and far. Travel texts become part of the historical narrative of the sites they discuss. Think of them as a time capsule, written testimonies that immortalise moments, traditions and destinations for generations to come. Travel writers and even travel photographers weave their works into a tapestry of human experiences, preserving and commemorating our diverse stories.

When we embark on our journeys and immerse ourselves in new environments, we become witnesses to history in the making. Every encounter, conversation, and exploration can shape our understanding of a place and contribute to the historical record. Travel writing allows us to capture these moments, freeze them in time, and share them with the world.

But travel writing is not limited to grand narratives or world-altering events. It is also found in the small details—the taste and scent of a local delicacy, the sound of haggling in a bustling market, and the wonder of viewing captivating natural landscapes.

Nkwazi has published numerous travel articles in the decade that it has existed, contributing to Zambia and Africa's historical narrative, and this edition is no different. 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"How come I can fly from London to Budapest on Ryan Air for £29, and it costs me K6000 to fly to Mansa?"

We hear such comments regularly. Comparing Zambian domestic air travel with Ryan Air is understandable but misses some key considerations, and we want to give some of the reasons why. In 2022 Ryan Air flew 160 million passengers. The EU is a vast single market of 448 million citizens with an average GDP per Capita of \$38,000. The size of the market and the economies of scale available are immense. In addition, airport costs are a significant cost for any airline, which means short routes are more expensive than long routes. The unit cost will be high if we have short routes combined with small aircraft. That is also why the average seat price between Lusaka and Johannesburg seems high compared to Johannesburg London. When a large aircraft flies long distances at high altitudes, the cost per seat is as low as the industry can achieve.

The aviation industry can offer Zambia much in the way of time efficiencies. Still, we are a very long way from aviation being a standard means of travel for the majority of our citizens. We need our economy to grow significantly before that can happen. We do have a very dynamic coach industry. The width of the network and the prices charged are most impressive. This is the mass market, and the Airline Industry must hope that a portion will move from coach to airline over time. However, the current average ticket price gap between surface travel and air is enormous. There is much dialogue between the government, the Zambia Airports Corporation, The Zambia Civil Aviation Authority and the airlines to reduce air travel costs, but there is no silver bullet.

We remain confident that the number of citizens choosing to travel by air will continue to grow yearly, but Ryan Air-like fares are a long way off for Zambia's airline industry.

Having said that, The GBP 29 one-way fare from London to Budapest is special, not the norm. At Proflight, we continue to offer our flash fares to allow more people to experience air travel. This is important to the entire Proflight family, and these are eagerly anticipated every week.



Ah, that is where the essence of Mwape's heritage intertwines with her artistic vision. Derived from her parents' names—Caleb and Rosario this name encapsulates inspiration and passion that permeates every corner of Atelier Camario.

Mwape's educational journey took her from Switzerland, where she dabbled in architecture

before embracing her passion for interior design. After graduating with a bachelor's degree, she ventured to Paris, immersing herself in the world of project management and interior architecture for her master's degree. The influence of her diverse background is apparent in her attention to detail.

After graduating and returning to Zambia, Mwape defied conventional paths, opting to freelance primarily in graphic design before eventually developing her visionary space. "Being a fresh graduate, whenever I approached people to collaborate, they'd always be sceptical and often questioned my knowledge. So birthing the Atelier was the best way to achieve my goals and avoid frustrating situations. Atelier Camario became a vibrant haven where the fusion of fashion, photography, graphics, and artistry thrives. In this place, the tribe of creatives finds solace, united by a shared vision", she added.

With every brushstroke of her university projects, Mwape knew her destiny was to shape her homeland with fresh perspectives and innovative endeavours. She added, "As an artist and a designer who has always been interested in the Zambian heritage, I always found it surprising that we didn't value our crafts and culture enough, at least not as much as foreigners do. I aim to change that!"

Mwape's philosophy thrives on collaboration and a shared commitment to utilizing local resources. Atelier's devotion to this principle is evident



through partnerships with brands like Kontama, Finders Keepers, and Salenipo. These brands, owned and operated by talented Zambians, embody the spirit of upcycling and thrifted fashion, showcasing the incredible potential of local materials.

Mwape's focus remains on the store, but in the future, she envisions Atelier's involvement in construction projects. She harbours aspirations of venturing into the realm of home and office design, carrying forward the narrative of supporting local artisans and utilizing locally sourced materials and labour. "You don't always have to import prefabricated items for building projects. Instead, I urge people to find locally made products made with indigenous resources. I want office spaces and homes to foster the same atmosphere as my store."

Atelier Camario is open six days a week, from Monday to Saturday. It is not just a shopping and dining destination. But it's a thriving hub for local artisans, art lovers, and creative minds who frequently visit the space for inspiration and collaboration. Items on sale include furniture, baskets, graphic design prints, artworks and clothing, both secondhand and upcycled. The versatile studio space is available for rent, perfect for fashion shoots, product photography, commercials and interviews, and more. 






## **DR GODWIN BEENE** A MINING INDUSTRY STALWART

erving as the country manager for the leading mining operation in Zambia is no easy feat but this task currently lies in the formidable hands of Dr Godwin Beene, the country manager of First Quantum Minerals (FQM) Zambia since January 2023. FQM boasts an expansive presence in Zambia's North-Western Province, operating three prominent mines: Kansanshi in Solwezi, Trident in Kalumbila, and Enterprise, a dedicated nickel mining operation in Kalumbila. Notably, FQM is Zambia's largest taxpayer, having made remarkable contributions that have surpassed an impressive \$5.7 billion.

Taking on the critical role of country manager, Dr Beene is responsible for overseeing FQM's interactions with the Zambian government and its affiliated agencies, enabling the mine leadership to concentrate on their core operational endeavours. In this multifaceted position, Dr Beene adeptly navigates the complex landscape of macroeconomic influences that challenge business operations. Moreover, he is the conduit for effectively communicating FQM's activities to the general public and investors. Reflecting on his responsibilities. Dr Beene explains, "I am entrusted with addressing matters that directly concern our operations in Zambia and

managing the crucial connection with the government. When issues warrant attention from government ministries, I promptly address them through escalation or resolution. Additionally, I diligently ensure that the media and wider stakeholders accurately portray our company, guarding against misrepresentations." This comprehensive summary encapsulates the vital role Dr Beene plays within FQM.

Born and raised in the remote Makala Village in Monze District of Southern Province, Dr Beene experienced the challenges of poverty first-hand. He vividly recalls attending school without shoes and writing on the ground in the early 1960s. However, his determination to overcome adversity led him to pursue higher education. After completing national service, Dr Beene was sponsored by a mining firm to study chemical engineering in the United Kingdom, commencing his bachelor's degree at the University of Wales, University College Swansea in 1978. He thus feels greatly indebted to the mining industry. In 1984, he returned to his alma mater and enrolled for a master's degree and ultimately obtained a PhD by studying the behaviour of natural mineral systems and clays and developing a model to predict the behaviour of mineral systems under

Dr Beene has significantly contributed to Zambia's mining industry throughout his illustrious career. He began working at the Nchanga Tailings Leach Plant in 1981, the largest hydrometallurgical plant in Africa at the time. During the time of privatisation of the mining industry by the MMD government, he was manager - metallurgy at Nkana Mine and crossed over to Konkola Copper Mines (KCM) under Anglo American Corporation as manager - technical services. Later, he returned to Nkana Mine to oversee the construction of a leach plant worth \$40 million, demonstrating his expertise and commitment to the industry. In addition to his accomplishments in the mining sector, Dr Godwin Beene made notable contributions in the realm of public service. He assumed the role of permanent secretary of the Ministry of Mines, serving under late President Rupiah Banda for three years. Following a change of government, he ventured into private consultancy until he joined FQM in 2019.

"The investment in the extension of S3 is to increase the life of the mine and continue offering direct employment to Zambians for the next 20 years." says Dr Beene, commenting on FQM's landmark \$1.25 billion investment to prolong operations at Kansanshi Mine. "As mining progresses and gets deeper, the grade of the ore reduces. The investment will increase the tonnage of the copper ore produced to compensate for the loss in grade, essentially preserving the quantity of copper produced at Kansanshi."

As Zambia aims to diversify the economy from copper mining, Dr Beene emphasised FQM's

commitment to investing a further \$100 million to boost operations at Enterprise. The nickel mine in Kalumbila District will be the largest nickel mine in Africa. "The mining sector is an exciting workplace because it provides a wide career development window. There is nothing you cannot do in mining," Dr Beene comments. He notes that the industry requires not just miners, engineers and geologists but also accountants, administrators and so many other professionals.

Shifting focus to community impact, Dr Beene shares that FQM's dedication to the communities surrounding its mining operations is evident through its sustainable development initiatives. "The focus has always been on people. While workers are a crucial resource to our operations, the people in our catchment area are equally important. Their well-being is of paramount importance to us," Dr Beene highlights. The company invests in schools, hospitals, and small businesses to ensure the sustainability and well-being of these communities. Additionally, FQM has played a crucial role in establishing the Kalumbila Multi-Facility Economic Zone (MFEZ), which will fast-track economic development in the North-Western Province.

Regarding environmental responsibility, Dr Beene states, "We make every effort to minimise our impact on the environment using technological advancements and sustainable mining practices." FQM has invested in a state-of-the-art tailings storage facility to contain the externalities within the mining areas. The company also actively replenishes biodiversity by planting trees in its catchment areas and restocking wildlife in the West Lunga National Park, contributing to the conservation efforts of the lesser-known national park in Zambia.



#### MODEST BEGINNINGS AND TENACITY

Dr Godwin Beene is at the helm of the largest mining firm in Zambia but his beginnings are far removed from his current situation. He grew up in Makala Village in Monze, Southern Province and recalls going to school barefoot and writing on the floor. However, he was strong-willed and was able to rise above his circumstances.

#### **NOT JUST A MANAGER**

Dr Beene jokes that he is not just a manager but also a man-urger. As a leader, he believes it is his duty to find out the aspirations of those he works with and to push them to achieve their potential. He presides over an inviting work environment where his colleagues typically refer to him as the Doc.

Dr Beene enjoys mentoring young people in the mining industry. He emphasises that there's a role for everyone as the industry requires multiple different skill sets.


#### MINING INDUSTRY VETERAN

Dr Beene academic background is in engineering and he has worked in the mining industry in both the public and private sector throughout his career. He has served as permanent secretary at the Ministry of Mines and is now the country manager of FQM Zambia and the president of the Zambia Chamber of Mines.

FQM is the biggest taxpayer in Zambia and runs the largest mining operation in the country with three mines: Kansanshi in Solwezi, Trident in Kalumbila and Enterprise Nickel Mine in Kalumbila (set to be Africa's largest nickel mine).

Outside of work, Dr Beene enjoys farming, photography and exercise. He enjoys working with his hands and prioritise his physical fitness. Further, Dr Beene tries to strike a balance between work and rest, despite a demanding schedule.

He chairs a successful mission school board on the Copperbelt dedicated to providing a holistic education to children and preparing them for tomorrow's challenging environment. He currently is the chair of the End Malaria Council (EMC), an initiative of an alliance of African leaders whose aim is to eradicate the disease in Africa. He is also the current president of the Zambia Chamber of Mines.

Dr Beene's passion for mentorship and developing young talent in the mining industry is evident. He believes in the potential of young Zambians and aims to increase their participation in the sector. Dr Beene encourages young people to think of mining as a field that offers diverse opportunities for personal and professional growth. He envisions a future where young, open-minded individuals play a crucial role in leading the industry's transition toward sustainability and creating a prosperous future for the country.

Outside of his work at FQM, Dr Beene dedicates his time to photography, farming and mentoring young people in the mining industry and in the engineering profession in general. He finds fulfilment in working with his hands and developing his farm in Kalulushi District. Maintaining his physical well-being is essential to Dr Beene, who walks up to 30 kilometres each week and ensures he rests adequately to make positive contributions in all aspects of his life.

#### THE LOBITO - LUSAKA OIL PIPELINE

PIPE DREAM OR REALITY

ipe dreams, many of us have harboured them throughout our lives. In our pursuit of success, we often encounter dreams that seem unattainable. Some are fulfilled through relentless determination, others by fortuitous chance, and sometimes it comes down to being in the right place at the right time.

During Zambia's independence in 1964, the country relied on a refinery near Umtali in what was then Southern Rhodesia for its fuel supply. Prominent multinational Oil Marketing Companies (OMCs) like Agip, Caltex, Mobil Oil, Shell-BP, and Total imported petroleum products from Southern Rhodesia into Zambia, establishing a lucrative intermediary system that catered to the local Zambian market.

However, the closure of the southern route forced Zambia to implement petrol rationing on December 23, 1965, which endured for three years and had a devastating impact on the economy. Recognizing the urgent need for change,

the Zambian government took decisive action and birthed the Tazama Pipeline project. This visionary initiative involved importing fuel into Dar es Salaam and channelling it through a pipeline into Zambia, with valuable technical assistance provided by the Chinese government, which was sensitive to the needs of newly independent African states.

The Tazama Crude Oil Pipeline was meticulously constructed to facilitate the transportation of crude oil from the port



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of Dar-es-Salaam to landlocked Zambia, achieving an affordable and sustainable economic cost. When installed in 1968, the pipeline boasted an impressive carrying capacity of 1,100,000 tonnes (1,212,542 tonnes) annually. However, by 2002, this capacity had regrettably deteriorated to 600,000 tonnes (661,387 tonnes) per year.

The tank farm situated in Dar es Salaam featured six onshore storage tanks, comprising three tanks with a combined capacity of 36,000 cubic meters (36,000,000 L) and three tanks with a combined capacity of 41,000 cubic meters (41,000,000 L). Along the route, seven pump stations were strategically positioned between Dar-es-Salaam and Ndola, encompassing five in Tanzania and two in Zambia.

Unfortunately, Zambia found itself cut off from Angola, an oil-producing country situated west of its borders. Angola gained independence after the April 25, 1974, Carnation Revolution in Lisbon. Lobito's port activities faced severe limitations due to disruptions in railway transit and the heightened insecurity prevalent during the Angolan Civil War (1975-2002). Prior to the war's disruption, the Benguela route, utilized by both Zambia and the Democratic Republic of the Congo (then Zaire), successfully transported 3.3 million tonnes in 1973. Subsequently, peace and stability during the 2000s paved the way for Lobito's reconstruction and marked a resumption of its path toward development.

Fast forward to 2023, and we find ourselves on the cusp of the Angola-Zambia Refined Petroleum Multi-Product (AZOP) project. Encompassing a 1,400-kilometer route from the port city of Lobito to Lusaka in Zambia, this monumental venture represents a remarkable \$5 billion deal to be jointly developed by the private sector, Angola's national oil company Sonangol, and Zambia's state-owned Industrial Development Corporation (IDC) as strategic equity partners. The Angola-Zambia Oil Pipeline, projected to span approximately 1,400 kilometres and boast a capacity of 200,000 barrels per day, will transport petrol, diesel, kerosene, and gas, thereby reducing fuel prices in Zambia while simultaneously serving as a lucrative source of revenue for Angola.





Demonstrating their unwavering commitment to the project, both President Hakainde Hichilema of Zambia and President Joao Lourenco of Angola have pledged their support. Zambia plans to acquire stakes in Angola's Lobito refinery, which is currently under construction. The project is scheduled for completion by 2026, with an expected refinery capacity of 200,000 barrels daily. Private investors, in collaboration with Zambia, are poised to own a majority 70% stake, while Angola's national oil company Sonangol will retain a 30% share in the oil infrastructure facility.

Zambia's strategic decision to import fuel from Angola holds immense potential for transformative benefits, including reducing pump prices and mitigating supply shocks. By acquiring a stake in the Lobito refinery and facilitating the proposed oil pipeline from Angola to Lusaka, Zambia is actively fostering and nurturing growing economic cooperation between the two countries.

With a keen focus on ameliorating the fuel sector, the Zambian government has diligently implemented various measures. These include diversifying fuel import sources and encouraging the adoption of alternative energy sources. Additionally, the government has sought to strengthen trade relations with neighbouring countries, exemplified by their proactive engagement with Angola, to reduce import dependency and lower pump prices.

Renowned Zambian energy expert and Chairman of the Energy Forum, Johnstone Chikwanda, has expressed his belief that energy diplomacy within a bilateral framework involving Zambia and Angola could prove to be the longawaited solution that has eluded both governments for the past two decades. Chikwanda posits that, aside from direct procurement based on energy diplomacy with a producing country, the only other options for guaranteeing affordable fuel would entail Zambia discovering its own oil resources. This endeavour would undoubtedly require considerable time and resources to develop adequately. So, is this ambitious venture merely wishful thinking, a mere pipe dream? Or is it the dawn of a well-oiled future for these two neighbouring nations? Only time will reveal the answer.

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#### AFRICAN CREATIVES AND A NEW KIND OF ECONOMY

f late, there has been a rise in the use of the term 'African creative'. It describes all sorts of global creative practitioners. from established fine artists exhibiting in decades-old galleries to university students selling self-made clothes on Instagram to small ateliers cropping up in cosmopolitan centres selling cultural goods at exorbitant prices. The amorphous nature of the term may be unsettling - indeed, who is a creative if everyone is a creative? However, it also indicates the term's popularity; if so many are willing to self-describe as African creatives - why? It is not merely a trend but an acknowledgement of the currency the term carries: creativity

is now the de facto term to describe

the added value that innovation brings to any activity. Lately, this has been acknowledged by public institutions.

From the 20th-23rd June 2023, the inaugural Africa Music, Arts and Culture Exhibition (AMACE23) will take place in Lusaka, Zambia, as part of ongoing festivities organised by the All-African Students Union (AASU) to commemorate their Golden Jubilee. Taking place after this publication goes to print, the full impact of AMACE23 remains unclear; however, its significant public profile - it is being 'hosted' by President Hichilema - along with the anticipated volume of functions, speakers, and participants means that the three-day event could potentially be a well-organised and successful one. Set to the theme of 'Harnessing the Dividends of the African Creative Industry through Investments in Youth Talents', the AMACE23 exhibitions bring together the Zambian government, local and international cultural, youth and student organisations, ostensibly seeking to leverage the connection between mobile youth economies and creative practice. AMACE23 can be seen as an affirmation of the new economies that creative practice has enabled worldwide and Africa in particular, and the active role that governments seek in engaging them.

This is most obvious in the tourism industry, the darling child of stable African governments wishing to diversify their economies. Over the past 20 years, tourism has become an important centre of economic activity on the continent. A 2022 report by the International Finance Corporation indicated that 2019 tourism contributed \$169 billion to Africa's economy, accounting for almost 7% of Africa's GDP. This was down to 3.8% in 2020 due to the outbreak of COVID-19. Thus, many of the tourist industry's gains in the subsequent two decades were lost, especially in Eastern and Southern Africa. In response, there has been a renewed pledge from African governments to formulate policy centred on reviving the tourism sector. For example, the South African government

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


developed the 'Tourism Sector Recovery Plan' very early during the pandemic. In contrast, the Zambian government has continued to reach out to relevant tourist institutions and authorities to offer support.

However, with a few exceptions, these continent-wide efforts often stop at the level of rhetoric. Despite the ongoing constraints of capital markets across the continent, large-scale domestic and foreign investment continues to pour into traditional sectors of the economy, especially in emerging and small tourist markets. In response, African governments seem hopeful that they can 'Harness' the 'Dividends' with minimal actual financial 'Investments', relying on their populations' 'entrepreneurial spirit' instead. Thus, without much formal backing, the tourism industry has had to rely on itself for promotion and development.

African creatives are well-poised to take up the mantle. Much of the tourism we encounter operates on encouragement of the desire to experience: whether it is the desire to experience a new culture, natural landscape, or for some, commodity. In many ways, this parallels the affective appeal of creative experience: art, literature, and food in short, culture - seek to engage the senses and imagination of an individual and enable the desire for more, often newer experiences. The optics of tourism also mirror the optics with which new creative economies operate - social media platforms operate similarly to tourism advertisements. The entire structure of social media platforms is to gain new users (much like touristic spots), with the attending hashtags, SEO optimisation, and smiling face at this or that beach/ mountain/ restaurant/ retailer to fill in the details.

The African creative adds value to this symbiotic economy through their proximity to African places, experiences, and culture. The African creative is familiar enough to the continent to be a valuable guide for foreign and domestic tourists, which in turn leads to new cultural experiences and expressions for both the tourist and the local. One type of African creative utilising this function is a new breed of the guidebook: travel



vlogging. Similar to travel writers of a past era, travel vloggers record their experiences, feelings, and tips of travelling with their audience through the use of videos and pictures. The casual and accessible nature of these accounts has helped them gain almost-instant popularity among a broad population. The content is usually uncritical and thus garners interest from institutions as a possible avenue for positive press. Take, for example, "akosuashirley", the Instagram handle of Akosua Shirley, a Ghanaian travel vlogger with 12,000 followers engaged by Ghana Tourism to promote tourism in the country. Her travel 'content' includes pictures of tourist attractions within Ghana. alongside adverts from the tourism authority. Other creatives are more subtle: another Ghanaian travel vlogger, Jasmine Ama - with 130,000 YouTube subscribers - produces video 'content' for an African diaspora market, and her videos re-enact African culture for

African ex-pats. Ama is not engaged by Ghana tourism, but her videos certainly promote Ghana as a tourist destination – as of 2020, tourism contributed over \$3.1 billion to its economy, up from \$118 million in 1991.

AMACE23 - and similar efforts by African governments - hope to replicate what the Ghanaian tourism industry has achieved. Leveraging African creatives and content creators is a relatively affordable alternative to more capital-intensive tourism schemes. It has the added benefit of promoting African culture. However, as with the travel writers of old, one wonders whether African creatives will be able to withstand the temptation of using misrepresenting African culture: framed within the context of tourism that wishes more and more to consume culture as a commodity, can there truly be creative activity whose added value is not an African stereotype?



Baobab College is at the forefront of reimagining education and empowering conversations for listeners that contribute to a better educational future for all students.



El Mukuka fulfilled his teenage dream with the release of his debut album in June 2023. Discover the journey to "Zebra" on page 74.



Lydes Malisheni, 58, was already a successful tobacco grower with over 10 years' experience in this field when she took her farming success to new heights – she began to grow groundnuts mainly to supplement her income, but the benefits have proven to be much more.

Lydes, who had been growing tobacco leaf since 2010 with Japan Tobacco International (JTI) Leaf Zambia, enrolled in the company's Market Match program. A grower-centric initiative that supports contracted growers to gain additional income from non-tobacco crops, aiming to guarantee food security and entrench Good Agriculture Practices. The program links JTI tobacco growers to markets for selling non-tobacco commodity crops and, through crop rotation, this program enhances soil fertility.



The Market Match program was first implemented in Zambia in 2020 with 713 growers as a flagship JTI program. Since then, JTI Malawi has also adopted the program and there are plans to implement it in Bangladesh, Ethiopia and Tanzania. There are now 2,629 growers in the 2023 season Market Match program in Zambia.

JTI growers are contracted to grow tobacco and supply JTI annually. With Market Match, growers receive inputs in the form of seed, gypsum and inoculants and are connected to off-takers who grade the groundnuts and export the crop for the international market. The off taker also provides training to JTI's Agronomy Technicians (extension staff) who then train growers



to help ensure they grow a quality crop. The groundnuts are grown on a rotational basis, and fix nitrogen in the soil, thus increasing soil health and potentially increasing crop yields.

Market Match in Zambia has delivered an average additional income of \$439 per hectare. This means growers have increased their incomes leading to greater food security, improved quality of life and improved the sustainability of their main farming activity – tobacco growing.

While most farmers experience success in the Market Match programme, it isn't always straightforward and easy. Lydes' first attempt was as she described it challenging. "During the first year I did not do very well due to a number of factors such as growing a different seed variety that's different from the traditional seeds and understanding the right number of labourers required to work on the field. The next year, I did not participate in the program because of the previous year's poor performance, but I noticed that the farmers who had entered the program in the second year produced better yields and earned good incomes from selling the groundnuts. After seeing this improvement, plus getting good feedback from some of my fellow farmers, I decided to give the Market Match program another try."

Lydes received seed and inoculants to plant half a hectare, which she grew alongside traditional varieties. Armed with the information she had gathered and her determination to succeed, Lydes was able to exceed her expectations. She produced over four tonnes' groundnuts. The highest in that year.

"The groundnut training has been useful in that we learned about inoculants, which are an important part of the growing process and something I never did when growing traditional varieties. I could see the difference across fields where I used inoculant and where I did not."

An additional benefit to this program that Lydes and other growers have experienced is the increased business and financial acumen through the customised trainings and knowledge of another crop. Market Match also helps to entrench good agricultural practices, such as crop rotation, pest and disease management, in the growers, thus ensuring the sustainability of the main crop – tobacco – and the additional crop. The farming methods practiced in Market Match also help growers become more resilient to climate change through multiple cropping.

"With the ever-increasing cost of production and climate change, it's critical that growers keep evolving and adopt new and sustainable farming practices to improve productivity and ensure that they continue to make sustained profits in agriculture. Market Match is a critical program for JTI because the success our growers experience directly impacts the leaf supply to the business," says Shane Vincent, JTI's Agronomy Director.

Growers enrolled in Market Match can overcome a critical challenge for many farmers in this region – over-dependence on a single crop for their income and livelihoods. In the 2021/2022 growing season, JTI provided maize inputs to 6,511 contracted growers who planted about 1,628 hectares of maize for their food security in addition to 2,232 growers selling 132,245kg of groundnuts for additional income.


The success of the crops in this program has strengthened JTI's resolve to expand the program not only into other countries, but into other non-tobacco commodity crops. These crops will undergo trials at the JTI Agronomy Development and Extension Training (ADET) facility.

#### NGC3372 - Eta Carina Nebula

Eta Carina Nebula is a vast cloud of gas and dust with several massive and bright stars, including at least a dozen, which are 50 to 100 times the mass of our sun! The strong emissions from the stars ionise the gas cloud and cause it to glow brightly.



#### M45 – Seven Sisters

A prominent and easily viewed open star cluster asterism, the Seven Sisters – also known as the Pleiades - is a favourite of southern hemisphere star gazers.




#### M42/Sh2-279 -Orion Nebula

The Orion Nebula and nearby Running Man Nebula are wellknown nebulae in the Orion Constellation. M42 is an example of a stellar nursery where new stars are constantly being born. Observations have revealed approximately 700 stars in various stages of formation.



#### M8/M20 – Lagoon & Trifid Nebula

The red Lagoon Nebula and its adjacent Trifid Nebula are located about 5,000 light-years away in the heart of our Milky Way Galaxy in the constellation Sagittarius. The Lagoon Nebula is a star-forming stellar nursery classified as an emission nebula.

am a retired telecommunications engineer who earned a PhD in satellite communications engineering from the University of Surrey, UK. I worked in the telecommunications industry for over thirty years in Europe and Zambia.

Having lived in the heavily light-polluted cities of Europe, I highly appreciate Zambia's pristine night skies, especially when viewed from dark rural sites. My astronomy epiphany occurred a few years ago, early one winter morning in the Lochinvar National Park.

I had gone on a hunt with a few friends and emerged from my tent in the dead of night to "see a man about a dog". As I happily went about my business, I noticed that the landscape was eerily well-lit as if a full moon was overhead, yet it was the new moon. I gazed toward the night sky, and my jaw dropped in utter disbelief.

An incredible Milky Way hung over my head, seemingly millions of stars forming a magnificent wide galactic swath from east to west. The intergalactic dust clouds in the Milky Way were clearly visible, and the stars shone so brightly, seemingly so close, that I felt I could grab a handful.

After what seemed like an eternity, I crept back into the tent and slept blissfully under African skies, ignoring my wet feet!

As we drove back to Lusaka the following day, I remember thinking I should try to photograph the night sky.

I thus fell into the astrophotography rabbit hole, from which I may never

emerge, much like the black hole at the centre of our universe!

I started my astrophotography journey with a Canon 60Da astro-modified camera and primarily took Milky Way photos. I would drive 30km to 40km southwards on the Leopards Hill road, where the night sky is relatively dark on a new moon and managed to take some quite decent Milky Way photos.

I then graduated to using a sky tracker, which tracks the night sky as it rotates around the southern celestial pole, and the camera sits on top of it. This allowed me to take many long exposure photos (of the order of minutes in duration). This, coupled with taking multiple exposures and combining them using stacking software, took my astro-imaging to the next level.


I soon tired of being limited to Milky Way photography and wished to graduate to photographing what is termed deep-sky targets – such as nebulae and galaxies. The various Canon camera lenses I had been using would not suffice for high-quality deep sky photography, and I needed a proper telescope.

I opted to buy the Williams Optics Redcat-51 and a one-shot-colour camera - the ASI294mc Pro. I also invested in a quality Sky Adventurer EQ6-Pro go-to equatorial mount and an ASIAir Pro computer to control the telescope, guide scope, electronic focuser and mount. The photographs in this article were taken with this gear.

My current equipment setup is termed "Widefield" and is ideally suited to imaging large nebulae. I will need a much larger telescope with greater reach to image much smaller structures, such as galaxies.

I am largely self-taught and have learnt the hobby by watching countless YouTube video tutorials, purchasing many books and spending many hours under the night skies. Astrophotography is a technically demanding and challenging hobby that is ultimately most fulfilling and enlightening.

I take my astrophotography images at Kwisoko Game Ranch in the Lusaka East area most nights with clear skies. I hope you will be inspired to make your own journey into this fascinating pastime and grow to appreciate the beautiful skies above us and marvel at the glory of the heavens!



#### M65/M66/ NGC3628 - Leo Galaxy Triplet

The Leo Triplet is a group of three interacting spiral galaxies in the Leo Constellation at a distance of approximately 35 million light years. The trio offer different and exciting visual perspectives of galaxy orientation, from an edgeon-barrel view to various degrees of inclinations of spiral galaxies.



#### B33/NGC2024 - Horsehead & Flame Nebula

The Horsehead Nebula and its companion Flame Nebula are situated in the Orion Constellation, close to the bright star Alnitak. The horsehead-shaped Horsehead Nebula is a light-gobbling nebula made of cold gas and stellar dust. Alnitak shines into the Flame Nebula, and its energetic light knocks electrons from the great gas clouds of hydrogen gas, making the flame glow brightly.

#### Southern Cross Region of the Milky Way

The easily identifiable, naked-eye asterism – the Southern Cross - is nestled in the heart of our Milky Way. This widefield image of this portion of the Milky Way reveals thousands of stars in a dense star field, with the prominent Southern Cross in the left part of the image. One can also easily identify other southern hemisphere gems in the image, including the Jewel Box, Coalsack Nebula, Lagoon and Trifid Nebula, and Eta Carina Nebula, on the

extreme right.





#### NGC6334 – Cat's Paw Nebula

At the bottom left of this image, the Cat's Paw Nebula looks like a celestial feline paw that has stepped in red paint and walked across the Milky Way. It lies about 5500 lightyears away from Earth, is 50 lightyears across, and is one of the most active star-forming nurses.













### LIUWA PLAIN NATIONAL PARK

The stark contrast of green and gold grasslands against the dark blue backdrop of storms paints a picture of pure magnificence. Thanks to African Parks Zambia, wildlife thrives in abundance. Hyenas rule the land, cheetahs roam free, and the lion population once reduced to one lone lioness - the late Lady Luiwa - is now thriving and increasing. Uncover the wonders of Luiwa, where nature's beauty calls out to be explored.

#### Sibika

Located in the south of the park, Sibika offers secluded rooms (all twins) on raised platforms with stunning views of the open plains and private decks. Enjoy abundant birdlife in the wet season from this small woodland retreat. The four classic en-suite reed and thatch rooms offer complete privacy, and the main decked area has a fully equipped kitchen and a braai area.

#### Campsites

Stay at one of three community campsites in Liuwa Park: Katoyana, Kwale, Mukalabumbu and Sikale. Each location has running water, clean ablutions and can accommodate up to 20 people. Camp Attendants will attend to your needs, but Sikale is a Wilderness camp for the self-sufficient and well-equipped. No water or camp attendants are provided.

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



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hroughout recent years, travel has become a large part of my work. As a practitioner in people and organisational development, I had covertly hoped that my work would someday allow me to leave the familiarity of urban living to make a meaningful difference in far-flung regions I had only learned about in my high school geography class.

As destiny would have it, my career growth played into this innate passion for adventure. Consequently, I have ventured to some of Zambia's most interesting and exciting corners seizing every opportunity to immerse myself in the unparalleled splendour and distinctiveness of the diverse landscapes that define the Real Africa we call home. Regardless of my whereabouts, the call of the wild has always beckoned, and I have consistently answered.

One of these work escapades that has profoundly instilled within me a lasting sense of gratitude has been the North Luangwa National Park, where conservation tourism is embodied by

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the teams that empower communities to live off the landscape sustainably and preserve the Luangwa ecosystems for future generations. I have come to subscribe to this form of eco-tourism because it has compelled me to execute my duties in a manner that minimises ecological impact while affording me firsthand encounters with the wonders of nature and the invaluable opportunity to uplift the very communities I serve.

Nestled gracefully along the banks of the majestic Luangwa River, within Zambia's Muchinga Province, lies the captivating North Luangwa National Park—an exquisite gem adorning the northern fringes of the renowned Luangwa Valley. This pristine sanctuary is part of the southern tip of the Great Rift Valley. It is one of Zambia's last untamed wilderness habitats, with unparalleled access to unfiltered experiences rarely encountered elsewhere on the continent.

As per my understanding, the National Park is only accessible to the valiant rangers from the Department of National Parks and Wildlife (DNPW), volunteers and employees of non-profits who have dedicated their resources and lives to sustainable landscape conservation. This restricted accessibility is perhaps why the North Luangwa National Park is not as commercially viable a tourist destination when juxtaposed with its southern counterpart. Therefore, you can well fathom the immense privilege I felt to travel and contribute to this area and support the teams doing essential work for the future of the Luangwa ecosystem.

Embarking upon the voyage to reach the revered North Luangwa National Park was a feat in itself. It took an average of 10 hours to drive from Lusaka to Mpika,

the closest town to the North Luangwa National Park, which forms a base for many visitors to rest and recoup before going into the untamed wilderness.

From Mpika, our expedition persisted for just over 2 hours, leading us to the very doorstep of the park's base office. The journey initially provided marvellous scenery of the Muchinga escarpment, with rolling hills, verdant valleys and sentinel-like inselbergs similar to those of the Mutinondo wilderness. The views then simmered down to plains with dotted settlements, and it eventually gave way to a series of hills with beautiful vantage points overlooking the endless expanse of mopane and acacia woodlands that make up the North Luangwa National Park.

When we finally arrived at the campsite, sheer delight engulfed me when I discovered my secluded haven nestled alongside a tributary of the illustrious Luangwa River. After settling down, I interacted with teams from the Department of National Parks and Wildlife as well as dedicated individuals of the Frankfurt Zoological Society's North Luangwa Conservation Project. They explained their profound mission to protect species of fauna and flora while promoting sustainable development in communities that live in the Game Management Areas surrounding the National Park. I learned that they periodically set out into these growing communities and collaboratively engage, educate and support them to use sustainable farming methods.

The communities have also been taught to utilise alternative livelihood approaches and are now supporting road and infrastructure development



within their districts. I also witnessed how communities are trained to use alternative energy sources and reforestation techniques to restore the wilderness habitat stretching across the Game Management Area and the National Park, I had the honour of acquainting myself with the dedicated teams monitoring diverse plant and animal populations working to curb human-wildlife conflict.

Facilitating sessions centred around leadership, engagement and cohesion across these teams was intrinsically fulfilling as I realised our work's impact in enabling them to progressively make their initiatives a reality and ultimately support the ecosystem's future sustainability. After my sessions were completed, I came to acknowledge that in our unique way, we should all play a role in supporting the efforts of front liners in the conservation space by taking an interest and raising awareness of the work being done. Together, we can forge a path towards safeguarding these natural wonders and preserving their irreplaceable splendour for future generations.

I also learned that the North Luangwa ecosystem boasts rising populations of elephants, buffalos, lions, rhinos and leopards, Africa's Big 5. The remarkable resurgence of these iconic species owes its gratitude to the conservation work done by these teams, especially in the

case of the Black rhino and elephant species. One particular moment stands etched in my memory—an experience akin to an enchanting Attenborough documentary—as I was granted the privilege to witness the nurturing of a few Black rhinos.

It was amazing to realise how rare it was to see these endangered animals in their natural habitat, let alone see how playful but aggressively territorial they can be. The rhinos have been allowed to roam freely within the park. They are consistently observed by

monitoring units, similar to what is done in Livingstone's Mosi-Oa-Tunva National Park

As twilight descended upon the park, a captivating spectacle unfolded before my eyes. Antelopes, zebras, warthogs, and elephants would gracefully gather along the riverbanks, partaking in their evening sojourns as they indulged in nature's sundowners. Little did I anticipate the gentle giants would cross the river under the dim moonlight sky and decide to savour the large succulent sausage tree pods within the campsite or seek to scratch an itch against the side of my tent. Dear reader, nothing can prepare you for the sheer presence, the grunts and the sound of flapping ears as an elephant leisurely makes its way around your humble abode in search of food, with nothing but a thin layer of polyester serving as your shield.

Thankfully, as the week unfolded, I gradually acclimated to these enchanting encounters. Yet, on one unforgettable evening in the camp, I found myself immersed in a chorus of distant 'whoops' and laughter emanating from hyenas. Suddenly, the deep resonating roar of a lion pierced the night and sent ripples in the air, ultimately leaving only crickets brave enough to serenade in the darkness. The North Luangwa National Park is also an oasis for avid bird enthusiasts, and you are sure to see several species around the woodland expanse.

I appreciated ending each day with the serene sight of a clear star-studded night as I took deep breaths of the crisp, clean air. Overall, my experience in Zambia's ultimate wilderness continues to impact my ongoing adventures positively.

As you embark on your work-related travels or venture forth in search of Zambia's myriad adventures, I encourage you to embrace the ethos of eco-tourism wholeheartedly by spending your resources at facilities that have proven to participate in conservation efforts while also promoting responsible practices that link the livelihoods of communities to the landscape. A few camps are being set up within the North Luangwa region this year, so if you want to go and experience the wilderness and support eco-tourism, you will be able to do so by this time next year.

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

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#### A CELEBRATION OF TWO CULTURES

ouse music, while still not the most popular or commercially successful genre in Zambia, has grown immensely over the last few years, garnering a fervent fan base of music lovers from different backgrounds; this fan base cuts across race, gender and class. If you've ever been to a house music show, you'll know that the crowd's diversity is unmissable.

Eleftherios Mukuka (better known as El Mukuka), one of Africa's fastestrising DJs and a proud Zambian export, released his debut album entitled *Zebra*, promoting and exemplifying diversity and unity in June of this year.

While the title speaks to how house music embraces people from different backgrounds, *Zebra* is much more personal for El Mukuka as someone who exists as black and white, Greek and Zambian. Black, through his Zambian father and white, through his mother, a Greek woman. *Zebra* acknowledges and

celebrates El Mukuka's two contrasting yet interlinked identities. It's about embracing and celebrating his African and European heritage.

Though El Mukuka is in a great place in his career right now, his story isn't one of overnight success though it may appear that way to those observing from afar. The house DJ started producing hip-hop music in his bedroom as a teen after listening to the likes of Dr Dre, Red Man, Eminem, Erick Sermon, 50 Cent and 2Pac. He fell in love with electronic music at age 18, when he was pursuing a degree at the prestigious Berklee College of Music in Boston, Massachusetts, His time at Berklee, however, was cut short because he lacked adequate financial aid. Because of this, he had to drop out halfway through his music degree.

"I'm a fighter," El Mukuka tells me during our conversation at a popular Lusaka restaurant where we caught up over coffee. With a crazy schedule, which included travel and rehearsal for the Zebra pre-album launch party at Alliance Française of Lusaka, El Mukuka was a hard man to pin down, so I was grateful for the chance to sit down and have a candid conversation with him. He tells me about his journey to his debut album and the battles he has had to wage to get to where he is.

"I've been fighting for my career since I was a teenager," he told me with absolute conviction in his voice. "I fought to get into music school, which was a big miracle. I found kids there that were way more talented, but God somehow allowed me the opportunity to get in. When I returned to Zambia, not long after dropping out of music school, I got a job as a sales agent working for Pepsi while pursuing my music on the side. In 2016 I released my song 'Bottle of Loneliness', which opened doors for me and gradually made it possible to get into music full-time. From 2016 onwards, real growth started for me; the journey has just been getting bigger and better with every new year."

While El Mukuka's career was on the rise, there were setbacks. He was signed to Sony Music Africa in 2018 off his track 'Weight of the Sun' but only briefly, as he had to part with the label abruptly. He also lost friends in the industry;

these were people he thought were trustworthy but worked behind his back to block opportunities for him. Despite all this. El Mukuka didn't stop moving forward and spreading his message of unity, good vibes, and positivity through his music. No matter the adversity or obstacles he faces as an artist in an everchanging industry with many politics around it, whether in Zambia or abroad, El Mukuka believes strongly in the concept of "failing forward." He doesn't believe in hitting dead ends but instead learns from his mistakes and modifying his strategy. In 'Simple Things,' a song featured on Zebra El Mukuka guotes a famous speech from Denzel Washington that he gave at Pennsylvania University in which he says: "If you don't fail, you're not even trying."



We discussed the album and the artist's El Mukuka worked with to make it a reality. Zebra boasts a diverse roster of featured artists, such as Adekunle Gold, Gaz Mawete, Abel Chungu and Karvendasoul. "Regarding features. there's this misconception that I don't work with Zambian artists," El Mukuka shares. "That's bogus! I've always and will always work with Zambian artists. What usually happens is when people don't see me working with the people they want me to work with, they criticise me - yet the credits on my album have so many Zambian names, from vocalists to instrumentalists. Most Zambian pop stars don't fit in with the kind of music I'm trying to make. I'm more drawn to artists on the folk side, such as Mumba Yachi and James Sakala, who both feature on the album. I can't forget Kreative Nativez and Sebastien Dutch, who alongside me are the main driving forces of house music in Zambia and are both featured on my album." he continues. "I also have some of Zambia's best instrumentalists like Sam Nyambe of the Crazy Fish band and David Andish, an extraordinary guitarist. David Andish plays on over half the album."


Of all the names of incredible Zambian artists that feature on the album, there's one El Mukuka mentions with a different kind of reverence, Marocco, whom he cites as one of Zambia's best but most underrated vocalists.

Fans who attended the *Zebra* pre-album launch party at *Alliance Française* can testify to how much of an unforgettable journey the album takes you on. The album experience was elevated as El Mukuka surprisingly performed all the songs with a live band, with himself performing on a grand piano and on the decks. Songs like 'Bosana' and 'No Wasted Time' got reggae and kalindula renditions that had the crowd riled up as they sang along enthusiastically.

Zebra gives insights into where El Mukuka is headed as an artist while paying tribute to where he comes from. It celebrates his sound, which graciously merges African and European cultures. It is also the culmination of 10 years of making electronic music. Since the Zebra pre-launch party in April, El Mukuka has gone on tour in Warsaw, Ibiza, Madrid, Oberhausen (Germany), Johannesburg, Lusaka and Kampala. He officially released Zebra on June 23rd.








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
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

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## PROFLIGHT ADDS CAPE TOWN TO ITS GROWING LIST OF SA DESTINATIONS



roflight Zambia launched the first-ever direct flights between Lusaka and Cape Town, reinforcing the nation's new-found dominance of the skies between South Africa and Zambia.

The Cape Town service is Proflight's fourth South African route, adding to its Lusaka-Johannesburg, Ndola-Johannesburg and Lusaka-Durban flights.

The direct service to South Africa's second-largest city, also known as the Mother City, means that travellers will no longer need to transit through Johannesburg for the first time.

Proflight will operate the new route to South Africa's legislative capital using its 50-seat CRJ jet, giving a flying time of 3 hours and 15 minutes.

Lusaka and Johannesburg and then onwards with its partner airlines Safair, Cemair and South African Airways.

The new service is also timed to connect smoothly with Proflight's early morning Ndola-Lusaka and evening Lusaka-Ndola flights.

"We are seeing growing demand for flights between Zambia and South Africa; hence the time is now right to launch this new direct service to Cape Town," said Proflight Zambia Director Flight Operations Captain Josias Walubita. "Travellers can be assured of a safe, reliable and friendly service that adds further freedom and flexibility to explore the region."

Cape Town is one of the world's top tourist destinations, as well as being an important commercial hub and a leading centre for regional conferences and exhibitions. Its famous Table Mountain landmark presides over some of the country's best beaches and cultural and nature attractions.

#### FLYING COMFORTABLE

- Before you fly, get a good night's sleep. Rest and some light exercise will help you cope on your journey.
- Wear loose, comfortable clothing and shoes that are not too restrictive.
- Eat a light, well-balanced meal before you travel and opt for a smaller helping than normal on the plane.

#### **SAFETY**

A Preflight safety demonstration is always made before take off. A safety pamphlet is also provided at your seat. Please familiarize yourself with its important information and note the nearest emergency exit.

#### **SMOKING**

Smoking on board is strictly prohibited. This includes any artificial device or e-cigarettes.

#### **ELECTRONIC DEVICES**

Please ensure that all electronic devices are turned off before taxiing and take off as they may interfere with the safe operation of the aircraft. These include cellphones, laptops, remote controlled games,

#### **BAGGAGE ALLOWANCE**

- In addition to the carry on luggage allowance provided herein, each passenger may carry without additional charge, the following carry on items the weight of which shall not exceed 5kg. The carry on items are permitted for use during the flight and when retained in the passengers' custody as listed


