infused with sultanas, the cape malay bread with curry and semolina, and a selection of flavoured clarified butters took my taste buds on a compelling journey. The greenhued butter, infused with molten salt, chives, and parsley, added a vibrant touch. The combination of flavours from the cape malay bread transported me to an aromatic oasis, evoking a warm, cosy feeling akin to snuggling under a fluffy blanket during the winter.

As an aperitif, I was presented with a visually stunning amuse-bouche in delicate, translucent mini-glass cups. At first glance, it appeared to be a coffee-based concoction crowned with microfoam. However, upon closer inspection, I discovered a symphony of braised pulled duck, butternut, and cappuccino infused with five-spice. The unexpected marriage of flavours lent a delightful sweetness with earthy undertones, presenting a remarkable twist on familiar ingredients.

Botanica's ambience effortlessly blends the serenity of a botanical garden with the charm of antique-style decor, creating a haven of relaxation between courses.

For the main course, I delighted in the kandolo steak tartare—a luscious, meltin-your-mouth medley of rich, tender beef sprinkled with biltong powder and accompanied by layers of mustard, curried apricot, and French bread. Since 1991, this enterprise has flourished into a leading retailer with seven stores nationwide, including investments in diverse industries. Micmar is etched into Zambia's fabric, and many have relied on Micmar for their building and home maintenance supplies. Many Zambians born in the 90s can recollect their father heading out to Micmar on a Saturday morning to buy supplies to fix a leaky tap or even build an entire family abode.

Today, the reins of the family business have been passed down to Michael Kroupnik, an ambitious and driven entrepreneur who is forging his own path while carrying forward the vision started by his father 32 years ago. We had the pleasure of sitting with Michael at Siesta by Mint, a charming, delightful restaurant nestled in Bishops Office Park in Kabulonga.

Siesta is part of the Mint family of restaurants that offer the perfect setting to enjoy breakfast, lunch or dinner. The restaurant offers various delicious meals and drinks in an industrial, architectural aesthetic surrounded by pan-brick and lush greenery. This harmonious blend culminates in creating a warm, inviting and friendly ambience where customers can sit back, relax, and enjoy quality food and excellent service. Michael's infectious energy and optimism set the perfect tone as we readied ourselves for an exciting conversation about business, life and everything in between.

Michael credits his dynamic and diverse cultural upbringing for his entrepreneurial acumen. He was born to a Russian-Iranian father and a Greek mother. He spent most of his childhood in Zambia and completed his higher education in the UK. This blend of influences crafted an individual with a distinctive worldview. Reflecting on his youth, he says, "I grew up in a multicultural household speaking multiple languages, which has fostered adaptability within me. I've developed empathy and a profound understanding of various cultures, qualities that prove indispensable in the fast-paced and demanding business world."

Trading has been in the Kroupnik family for three-quarters of a century dating back to Michaels's grandfather, who owned a hardware store in Iran during the 1950s. In 1985, Michael's father, Roman Kroupnik, came to Zambia and in 1991 he started a small trading business that today has expanded into property development and manufacturing. At the core of the business is the desire to serve customers with quality products and a deep commitment to giving back to the country that has given the family so much. 66

Michael was not always destined to join the family business. After graduating from university in the UK, he moved to Greece, where he completed his military service and began a career as a shipbroker in one of Greece's most prominent firms. As a shipbroker, Michael assumed the crucial role of an intermediary, facilitating the intricate shipping process. His responsibilities encompassed negotiating deals between shipowners and charterers, coordinating the transportation of goods and products, and facilitating transactions between buyers and sellers of ships.

He enjoyed early success in this role and began climbing up the ladder. As his career began to take shape, he had to decide whether to double down and grow his career as a shipbroker or join the family business. He chose the latter; today, he is one of Zambia's leading business minds.

Apart from operating Micmar. Michael is also a property developer and is the man behind Pangaea Office Park, Trinity Park (which he sold to ZCCM-IH) and most recently, Agora Village in Mass Media. He tells us how he started in property development. "I decided to expand into real estate because I saw the opportunity to create value in the Zambian market. We can tell accurately, through the Micmar sales, how well the construction industry is doing and when I decided to build Trinity Park. the industry was booming. We have a competitive advantage in sourcing building materials, so all we needed to do was build a local team to execute the vision. Since then, we have developed commercial and retail properties and, more recently, a unique mixed-use property in Lusaka called Agora Village." Africa needs visionary entrepreneurs like Michael, who possess the ingenuity to devise solutions that uplift the region rather than

exacerbate existing challenges. Michael always has his eyes open to find homegrown solutions that can further the development of Zambia and its people. In 2016, he joined forces with like-minded partners to establish Inde Credit, a microfinance company with a profound mission—to unlock the potential of Zambian SMEs by offering them flexible and tailor-made financial solutions. As of 2023, Inde Credit has disbursed over K1 billion to more than 450 Zambian SMEs, creating more than 3,000 jobs.

In line with his vision for progress, Michael has established Kroup Mining & Processing as another venture aimed at challenging the existing norms and elevating the involvement of Zambian enterprises in the mining value chain. The Solwezi-based company currently focuses on processing copper ore into cathodes for the export market and plans to add significant value to Zambian copper to achieve vertical integration. "We believe the time is right for this with all the emphasis on green energy and EVs, a vision we are happy to share with the Government of Zambia. We want to be one of the few local businesses manufacturing high-end finished copper products at home. Zambian businesses must add value to our natural resources, and we look forward to carrying the flag for years to come."

Albeit with the many challenges of running a business in Zambia - such as the high cost of business, lack of infrastructure and an unpredictable local environment - Michael is still actively pursuing new avenues of growth. Micmar recently opened a new store in Kasumbalesa, hoping to access the Congolese market across the border. The business has also launched the Micmar Academy. This personal development course aims to upgrade the skills of Micmar employees while building their morale and making them ready to take on other opportunities outside work.

Michael's philosophy is to never allow himself to look back and ask "what if?", but to 'go for it' or push himself until he feels satisfied or uncomfortable, a philosophy he fondly shares with his children, "if you believe in it, then just go for it".

## **SCALE AND CONTINUITY IN ZAMBIAN BUSINESSES** CAN ZAMBIAN BUSINESSES SPAN GENERATIONS?

ambia, located in south-central Africa, has an estimated population of 18.4 million people. Within this population, the working age group (15 years or older) was approximately 10 million in 2021. The International Labour Organization reports that a significant portion of the Zambian population, 88.7 per cent to be exact, is engaged in informal work. Of these individuals, 87.6 per cent are informal workers employed in the informal sector, while the remaining 11.3 per cent are employed in the formal sector. These statistics highlight the substantial

presence of the informal sector and the entrepreneurial spirit prevalent among the Zambian population. Furthermore, they underscore the significance of businesses in supporting the livelihoods of the Zambian people, as formal employment is not the primary source of income for most households.

While it is commonly believed internationally that most businesses fail within the first five years, local research has yet to be conducted to examine the longevity of Zambian businesses. However, there is a thriving informal sector within our communities, where

the formal sector accounts for only 20 per cent of the total employment rate. Consequently, most individuals are self-employed, involved in small-scale agriculture, or running small businesses. This raises an important question: why aren't Zambian businesses growing to span multiple generations and contributing to the expansion of the formal sector? What measures can be taken to increase the growth rate?

When analysing the factors that need to be considered to facilitate growth in Zambian businesses, it is essential to focus on two major categories:

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environmental and individual factors.

#### **Environmental Factors:**

- 1. Access to loanable funds at competitive interest rates: Businesses require a favourable environment to thrive. One key factor is access to loanable funds at competitive interest rates. A survey of major banks in the private sector revealed that the lending rate in Zambia was around 25.25 per cent per annum as of February 2023. In comparison, large industrial economies like China and the United States have significantly lower interest rates of 3.55 and 5 per cent per annum, respectively. The high cost of capital in Zambia puts local businesses at a disadvantage, as foreign investors from countries with lower interest rates have more favourable conditions. This hinders the competitiveness of Zambian enterprises, as companies with lower costs can sell products at lower prices, making it difficult for local companies to compete. Lowering the cost of capital and providing access to affordable loanable funds are essential for creating an enabling environment for business growth.
- 2. Making agriculture profitable through appropriate farming methods, technological advancements, and agricultural mechanisation: Agriculture plays a crucial role in the Zambian business landscape, employing 71 per cent of the total workforce. Within these statistics, 90 per cent of farmers are engaged in smallscale farming activities. Although the government has made efforts to subsidise subsistence farmers through initiatives like the Farmer Input Support Programme (FISP), over 90 per cent of Zambians are still involved in subsistence farming. While FISP has maintained productivity to some extent, it has yet to effectively facilitate the transition from small-scale to large-scale agriculture. Farmers have become dependent on the program rather than growing their businesses. Improving the success of initiatives like FISP requires the timely delivery of

inputs and effective monitoring and evaluation. Additionally, mechanisation is essential for the growth of agriculture as it improves efficiency, saves time and costs, and guarantees output.

#### Individual Factors:

- Focus on education: There are 1. common misconceptions about not needing education to succeed in business. These myths often arise from the success stories of college dropouts who build multimillion-dollar corporations. However, it is essential to recognise that these individuals represent exceptions rather than the norm. Moreover, a closer examination of the management structures within these companies reveals that while the owners may lack formal education, they employ teams of accountants, engineers, and business analysts, many of whom hold university degrees. Education is vital in understanding best business practices, financial literacy, and productivity, which are essential for running successful businesses. The government of the Republic of Zambia has recently reintroduced free education from grade 1 to grade 12. This initiative will have far-reaching benefits, positively impacting the economy and the wider community.
- 2. Knowledge transfer to the younger generation: Most of Zambia's population is under 35. Ensuring continuity in business requires actively involving the younger generation in entrepreneurship



activities and providing mentorship opportunities. Additionally, it is crucial to focus on fostering the growth and empowerment of the youth, considering they make up a significant proportion of the population. Initiatives such as zero-interest loans like 'Busulu' and entrepreneurship training, implemented by the Citizens Economic Empowerment Commission (CEEC), aim to address this need.

The future of the Zambian business landscape holds abundant opportunities for growth and development. However, just like plants, these opportunities must land in the right environment for growth to flourish. By addressing environmental factors like access to affordable funds and making agriculture profitable through appropriate methods and mechanisation, combined with a focus on education and knowledge transfer to the younger generation, Zambia can create a conducive environment for business growth.



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# **IMPACTS OF NAPSA'S 20% PARTIAL WITHDRAWAL**

he current economic challenges and global uncertainties, including the impact of climate change, the Russia-Ukraine conflict, and the high cost of commodities in Zambia have had long-term consequences on the livelihoods of many Zambians. Recognising the urgent need for accessible cash to cope with the high cost of living, President Hakainde Hichilema recently enacted the National Pension Scheme Amendment Bill 2023. This amendment allows NAPSA members who have contributed to the scheme for at least five years or made 60 contributions to withdraw 20 per cent of their pre-retirement pension benefits.

President Hichilema emphasised the significance of this amendment, stating, "We have signed into law the National Pension Scheme Amendment Bill 2023, which aligns with our commitment to the Zambian people. This new law empowers citizens to reinvest their funds into various ventures and assets of their choice." The National Pension Scheme Amendment Bill 2023 replaces the previous National Pension Scheme Act of 1996, allowing members to access a pre-retirement benefit. As of June 2023, NAPSA has disbursed K7.5 billion to over 316,000 members, with a total allocation of approximately K11 billion to cover 600,000 eligible members, as reported by the pension authority.

Notably, this development has prompted many workers to queue at various offices across the country, while others are utilising online channels to verify their details and check their accumulated savings. Many contributors have expressed their intentions to invest in small-scale businesses or complete their building projects, among other plans.

With withdrawal amounts ranging from a minimum of K5,000 to a maximum of K160,000 per contributor, Lawson Chama, a civil servant, enthusiastically described the partial withdrawal as a game-changer that revived his real estate business. Chama shared his experience, stating, "After receiving my partial withdrawal, I invested the funds in constructing a boarding house due to the high demand for student accommodation. I anticipate a threefold return on my initial investment of K100,000. I plan to reinvest my earnings into building a block of flats."

Nelia Banda, an employee at a Chinese clinic in Lusaka since 2002, expressed optimism about the 20 per cent withdrawal threshold, believing it will lead to significant socioeconomic transformation among the working class. Banda shared her aspirations: "I have always wanted to start a poultry business. Once I withdraw my 20 per cent pre-retirement funds from NAPSA. I plan to build a poultry house, purchase day-old chicks, and buy feed to kickstart poultry production. The 20 per cent partial withdrawal is an excellent opportunity for many to venture into entrepreneurship and contribute to the economy's growth."

This marks the first time in Zambia's





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pension industry history that employees have been granted access to a portion of their retirement benefits before retirement age.

Economic analysts anticipate that this measure will stimulate economic development, reduce poverty, and boost trade and commerce. The increased spending resulting from the higher disposable income of recipients will benefit both the private sector and the national economy. The Pensions and Insurance Authority (PIA) has advised employees to invest their partial withdrawal in ventures that offer a return, emphasising the importance of avoiding excessive consumption.

Considering the long-term outcomes of this legislation, Zambian employees should refocus their efforts and plan for a better future through strategic savings that tap into the underutilised potential of the informal sector.

Kelvin Chisanga, a financial analyst based in Lusaka, believes that as contributors access their partial benefits, the country will witness increased trade and commerce, leading to higher government revenue. This revenue can be utilised for service delivery and the development of other sectors. Chisanga remarked, "The K11 billion injected into the economy by NAPSA will create aggregate demand, particularly by augmenting liquidity challenges that the economy has been facing. For those with a business mindset, this money serves as a seed to recapitalise their operations."

Given the socioeconomic impact of the Covid-19 pandemic, which resulted in job losses, the timely availability of NAPSA's pre-retirement package is expected to revive individuals' economic prospects.

ActionAid Zambia also supports the belief that the 20 per cent partial withdrawal of pension benefits will increase liquidity in the economy, benefiting small-scale entrepreneurs and improving the well-being of senior citizens. This increased liquidity will also enhance access to public services, such as healthcare, improving retirees' quality of life.

However, considering the challenges associated with accessing funds before reaching retirement age and the potential negative effects of this policy shift, stakeholders have urged the government to engage various parties and implement comprehensive financial literacy capacity-building initiatives. These initiatives will enable NAPSA beneficiaries to benefit from their funds by engaging in productive investment opportunities.

While the lack of a robust social security system remains a concern for Zambians, the most pressing issue is the daily struggle for shelter, food, and hope. While some NAPSA beneficiaries leverage their 20 per cent partial withdrawal to establish thriving businesses and grow their investment portfolios, others opt to invest in low-risk instruments such as government bonds or treasury bills. These investments contribute to individual wealth accumulation and national development. Amos Kunda, a mine worker from the North-Western province, shared his decision, stating, "I chose to invest my 20 per cent in government bonds. Once they mature, I will use the interest to support my children's education and reinvest in my agribusiness."

The National Pension Scheme Amendment Bill 2023 has introduced a significant change in the pension landscape of Zambia. By enabling partial withdrawals, it allows individuals to invest in various ventures, thereby promoting socioeconomic development, reducing poverty, and stimulating economic growth. The government, financial experts, and stakeholders emphasise the importance of strategic investments to maximise the long-term benefits of these partial withdrawals and encourage the beneficiaries to contribute positively to the nation's progress.

From a near-fatal buffalo attack during his scout training, to becoming an award-winning conservationist, Neddy Mulimo's unwavering dedication embodies the heart of conservation, fueled by passion and purpose.

frican buffalos are notorious for being the most dangerous of the Big Five game animals. They're massive, incredibly strong, remarkably fast, foul-tempered, aggressive (especially when injured), fiercely protective of their herds and hold grudges (they've been known to attack hunters that have wounded them, even years later). During his scout training in 1985, Neddy Mulimo learned of the buffalo's fierce reputation the hard way. Two months into his training at Nyamaluma Wildlife Training College in Mfuwe, he was ambushed by an injured buffalo and only narrowly escaped with his life. Neddy was so distraught by the incident that he nearly guit his training, but ultimately, he recommitted himself to wildlife protection. He laughed about the buffalo encounter months later during his graduation, with renewed vigour for continuing his work as a dedicated conservationist. 36 years later, in 2022, he was named the Tusk Wildlife Ranger of the Year and travelled to London to receive the prestigious award presented to him by Prince William. It was a world away from where he works today and where he grew up.

As a young boy growing up in Lusaka's Matero township, Neddy Mulimo dreamed of becoming a truck driver. He craved the freedom of the open road and opportunities to travel within and outside Zambia, and he thought truck driving would give him that. While in the 5th grade at Matero Boys School, Neddy joined the Chongololo Club, where he learned about the natural environment and wild animals, big and small, which changed his life's trajectory. Through the club, in the midst of an urban jungle, he uncovered an enduring love and passion for the natural world that never left him.

In secondary school, Neddy went on a school trip to Treetops School Camp in Kafue National Park. For Neddy, the city boy who loved nature, this was his first time in the bush and the first time he got to see wildlife up close. and he knew this was where he belonged. To this day, he prefers a quiet life in the bush to city life, choosing birdsong, the grunting of hippos and the bellowing of elephants over the racket of disorderly Lusaka traffic. Neddy's story underscores the importance of education, both in the classroom and in the untamed wild, in advancing the conservation agenda. Club sessions in a classroom and a school trip to the bush ignited an unceasing love for nature and a decades-long career in conservation, which has touched countless lives. "I learned the importance of animals. I learned why trees are there and what they provide for us, and I developed my passion for nature," Neddy shared about his experience.

"I'm here to help communities affected by human-animal conflict and protect wildlife"

Neddy became a driver, but not in the way he had initially envisaged. He was, however, on the path toward his true calling. After high school, he worked as a driver for an education NGO, the Wildlife and Environmental Conservation Society of Zambia (WECSZ). He delivered educational material around Lusaka and Kabwe, including magazines produced by the club that sparked his love for





nature and conservation, the Chongololo Club. After five years on the job, he was sent to Nyamaluma to train as a tour guide in 1980. Following his training, he was transferred to another place that had already profoundly impacted his life, Treetops School Camp. There, he empowered school children from all over Zambia with knowledge, "showing them the beauty of wildlife and why they should all be rangers in their own way."

During his time at Treetops, he met many influential people at the Department of National Parks and Wildlife, and it was them who encouraged him to train to become a scout. After qualifying as a scout, he worked in Kabwe, Mumbwa and later for 14 years in Blue Lagoon National Park. While working in Blue Lagoon, Neddy rose through the ranks and became a wildlife police officer and was in charge of operations at the park. There is a wistfulness in his voice when he speaks about Blue Lagoon, where he worked the longest. It's no surprise when he says, "It became like my home and it's the park I love most."

After almost a decade and a half in Blue Lagoon, Neddy was transferred to Mumbwa and worked in the regional head office for four years before retiring. He retired in May 2012, bringing an illustrious career to an end, or so he thought. It was to be a short-lived retirement; the world of conservation still needed Neddy. He was called back to duty after reports of poaching along the Lunga River in Kafue National Park. A team of young rangers required specialised training to tackle the reported poaching. Everyone agreed that Neddy was the best person to train them, so he was called back to work in July 2012 and dutifully obliged. Three months later, he began working with the local conservation NGO Game Rangers International (GRI). Neddy is currently based in Kafue National Park and still works for GRI today, heading their Special Anti-Poaching Unit (SAPU), which he helped establish. Some of SAPU's successes include arresting over 700 poachers and traffickers, seizing 372 kilos of ivory and confiscating over 360 firearms.

Neddy's experience, expertise and dedication have undoubtedly been pivotal to SAPU's success. His work. however, involves protecting wildlife, supporting his fellow rangers, and looking out for the communities in and around the areas he works in. He says, "I ensure the rangers under the Special Unit are looked after very well. As someone who has already done the work younger rangers are doing, I know what they experience and what they need to thrive and do a good job. I have also worked with communities and dealt with human-animal conflict. I'm here to help communities affected by human-animal conflict and protect wildlife."

His vast, dedicated experience in wildlife protection, his experience as an educator and a trainer, the work he has done towards developing policies that look out for rangers and his work with communities carried out over nearly 40 years sums up why Neddy was named Tusk Wildlife Ranger of the year.



Neddy hopes his win will encourage other rangers and anyone who wants to contribute to conservation efforts in Zambia to persevere. While he is proud of his achievements, he quickly emphasises that being a ranger is challenging and rife with danger. "It requires dedication, self-sacrifice and a great passion for nature. The dangers are many. When I started this vocation, we used hunters' rifles and faced poachers with military-grade weapons. Also, though most people in the community support us, there are those few who are against us because we stop them from hunting game meat. Then there is the danger posed by wild animals." At this point, we discuss the wounded buffalo that attacked him two weeks into his scout training. Though he came close to quitting at the time, he chose to see the experience as a teaching moment. He told himself, "These are the animals we have come here to look after. Now



that I have survived, I've learned a lesson and should continue. The animals I had vowed to protect can pose a danger to me but that shouldn't be a reason not to protect them. These animals cannot distinguish between me, a poacher, or anyone who intends to harm them."

Neddy is the third Zambian to be named Tusk Wildlife Ranger of the Year, the first and second being the late Solomon Chidunuka (2017) and Benson Kanyembo (2019). He is immensely proud of the country's legacy of conservation and efforts made to safeguard its natural heritage. Reflecting on this legacy, he shares, "Zambia has come a long way in terms of conservation. Even the founding father, Dr Kenneth Kaunda, was a man who loved nature. Whenever he took a holiday, he spent it in Mfuwe to be closer to animals and nature. In fact, the budget for my intake as a trainee scout came from State House, following direct orders from KK. Our group was known as the KK 40."

There is no doubt that Neddy Mulimo has cemented his place in Zambia's conservation history and has paved the way for legions of others to follow in his footsteps. Whether or not he enters a second retirement, he promises to continue doing the wildlife conservation job "until I am completely useless."

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angila Trail Series has gone from humble beginnings to a highly anticipated, exhilarating event in Zambia in just a few short years. "At our first event in 2016, the series had about 50 runners, and the entire race was able to be organised in two weeks. Today, the event attracts over 600 participants and sells out a month in advance," recalls Jon Stacey, founder of Tangila Trail Series.

The rapid growth of Tangila Trail Series comes as no surprise. Held on Masebe Ranch, a scenic private game ranch in Mkushi, Tangila has come to be known as Zambia's premier trail running event and attracts participants from all corners of the country and beyond. The event has evolved significantly since 2016 and has included mountain bike and open water swimming races in the past, but recently re-focused on what it has come to be famous for - stunning yet challenging trail runs.

The 2023 event featured three new courses: a tame 11 kilometres for beginners, a hilly 22 kilometres for more ambitious runners, and a demanding 33 kilometres with a strict four-hour cut-off for seasoned athletes. The winners



across multiple age categories included youngsters from Chengelo School, veteran members of local running clubs, sponsored employees from nearby commercial farms and scouts working in Zambia's national parks, as well as participants from far and wide seeking time in nature and happy to do their part for conservation.

With its rapid rise in popularity and profile over the years, Tangila Trail Series has leveraged its brand to raise money to protect Zambia's fragile wildlife and wild spaces, a cause close to the heart of the Stacey family. Since it first broke even a few years ago, all profits from the event have been directed to The Elephant Charge (www.elephantcharge. org), Zambia's largest platform for raising and distributing funds for wildlife conservation.

Deepening its connection to the conservation community, Tangila Trail Series also began hosting the annual Solomon Chidunuka Memorial Challenge in 2021. This fierce competition brings together all major Zambian conservation organisations to tackle the 22 kilometres trail in honour of a late legend of local conservation. Teams of six from each organisation must include at least three women and no more than three professional scouts, ensuring that



support staff also have a chance to get the full Tangila experience. For the third year in a row, this year's trophy was raised by the impressive team from North Luangwa Conservation Programme, with the team from Nsumbu Tanganyika Conservation Programme hot on their heels.

Spectators at this year's Tangila Trail Series were thrilled to check out the Buffalo Soldier Challenge. A nontechnical short race for local farm staff who ride single-speed bicycles (commonly referred to as Buffalo bikes), this competition was recently added to allow a wider spectrum of the Mkushi farming community to experience the unique blend of competition and camaraderie that defines Tangila. Buffalo Bicycles, a local subsidiary of World Bicycle Relief, also got on board as an official sponsor this year.

In addition to Buffalo Bicycles, Tangila Trail Series is supported by an extensive network of local sponsors, ranging from multinational corporates to small family businesses. Stanbic Bank Zambia has been the loyal lead sponsor of the event since 2017 and arrived this year with over 20 participants, including their CEO and several executive team members. This year's generous Gold Sponsors, North Swaka Trust and Mushingashi Conservancy, were also strongly represented on the trails. Both are privately-funded organisations working with local communities to protect vast areas of Zambia from poaching and deforestation.

"At its heart, Tangila Trail Series is all about gratitude," says Stacey, "Zambia has been very good to my family, and we feel fortunate to call it home. My grandparents started farming in Mkushi in 1965, and my parents started their adventure on a nearby property in 1978. For over 40 years, they have diligently developed Masebe Ranch into the beautiful place I feel lucky to call home. What better way to acknowledge our good fortune than to share it with others while raising awareness and funds for a cause we care about deeply."

Today, that journey continues, tracing Zambia's footsteps of progress, resilience, and unlimited potential.

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#### 1964 Flag Raised and Independence Declared - A Wind of Change in Mother Zambia

Most people who were old enough to comprehend the significance of this moment speak of it like it was yesterday. At 23:56 on 23rd October 1963, Zambians rose in reverence of the Union Jack, the de facto national flag of the United Kingdom, for the last time as it lowered, signifying the end of British rule in Zambia. At precisely 00:01 on 24th October 1964, a hush fell over the stadium as the national flag of a newly independent Zambia was hoisted for the first time. A thunderous jubilation filled the stadium as fireworks exploded overhead, glittering across the night sky. At long last, like a bird set free, Zambia spread her wings.

#### 1966 Zambia's First University is Opened - An Act of Patriotism and the Start of a Bright Future Ahead

The eyes of the world were on Zambia as it embarked on a four-year development plan. As a former protectorate, it now required Zambians to fill professional roles. The Zambian people rallied to build the country's first university, pooling resources to aid its construction. Zambians in the diaspora sent what they could. Those who could not donate money donated crops and animals. The poorest even volunteered their labour.

At the grand opening, President Kaunda stated, "Let this self-sacrifice on the part of the poor people never be forgotten for generations to come. Let it remain an inspiration to all so that every good that shall come out of this building be to the greater glory of people".



#### 1969 Zambia's First Currency is Unveiled

After independence, Zambia employed Zambian Pounds as its first currency and shillings to denote smaller denominations, but by 1968 a new, truly Zambian currency was in the works and in 1969, the first Zambian Kwachas and Ngwees entered into circulation. The first 50 Ngwee coin depicted a maize cob, the slogan, "Grow more Food for Mankind", and Dr Kaunda's profile on the reverse.









#### 1970 Zambia - Tanzania Railway Constructed - Central and Southern African States Connect

Despite being independent, Zambia was economically tied to Southern Rhodesia as copper was still dependent on Rhodesian Railways via the Victoria Falls Bridge to Mozambique. Determined to prove that Zambia was capable of self-management, President Kaunda lobbied for a railway to connect Zambia to the Tanzanian port.

The Tanzania-Zambia Railway Authority was established in 1968, and by 26th October 1970, track laying had commenced from Dar es Salaam. The railway line is a tribute to exceptional engineering skill, specifically in mountainous terrains where many Tanzanian, Zambian and Chinese workers tragically lost their lives. The railway reached the Zambian border of Tunduma in August 1973 and connected to the Zambian Railways line at Kapiri Mposhi in June 1975.







#### 1972 Birth of Zamrock and the Rise of The Zambian Sound

When President Kaunda declared that radios must play 90 per cent Zambian music, this ignited the creativity of local artists who covered popular songs and tapped into their culture and heritage to produce unique Zambian music.

By the early 70s, Zamrock, a fusion of traditional African music and various genres of rock music, blues, and funk, had burst onto the scene. Picture this, the raspy growl of a bass guitar solo accompanied by thunderous chants, "We will, we will ZAMROCK you", like the famous Queen anthem. Bands and artists such as The Witch, Ngozi Family, Dr Footswitch and jazz musicians like Cephas "Mr Summertime" Maseko inspired many other artists to join the musical movement.









#### 1980 The Copperbelt, Southern Africa's El Dorado

By the late 70s, Zambia's copper and mining industry had reached worldwide acclaim, with Zambia producing and controlling 12 per cent of the global copper market. As a result, labourers began flocking to the Copperbelt in search of work in the mines. In response to the region's growing population, community development training centres were established to educate miners and community members.



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#### 1988 Kalusha Bwalya Named Footballer of The Year - Zambia Ku Chalo (Zambia to the World)

Kalusha Bwalya's remarkable career came to a head when he scored the famous hat-trick, which led to Italy's humiliating 4-0 loss. The eyes of the world turned to Kalusha as he was named African Footballer of the Year in 1988 by France Football magazine. Shortly afterwards, he played for the European team PSV, where he spent the next six seasons, winning three championships.

Kalusha went on to appear in 87 international matches, scoring 39 goals. Though captain during the qualification for the 1994 World Cup, he was not on the ill-fated flight that tragically claimed the entire team's lives off the coast of Gabon. He continues to participate in Zambian football actively and fuelling the fire of Zambia's aspiring football stars.





#### 1989 Victoria Falls Declared a World Heritage Site - The Glorious Smoke that Thunders "Gets its Flowers"

Victoria Falls, or Mosi-oa-Tunya (the smoke that thunders), is one of the world's most aweinspiring natural wonders, with its majestic beauty and sheer grandeur. The breathtaking curtain of falling water draws visitors from across the globe. Here, the Zambezi River's thundering force plunges into a ravine over 915 metres deep. The resulting spray can be seen from 30km away. In 1989, the UNESCO World Heritage Committee considered the natural phenomenon and inscribed it as a World Heritage Site.









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#### 1991 Zambia moves From One Party to Multi-Party Political System - A New Dawn For Democracy

Before 1991, Zambia was a one-party state led by the United National Independence Party (UNIP) government. There was growing opposition to UNIP's monopoly on power, and this led to the formation of the Movement for Multi-Party Democracy (MMD) in July 1991. Zambian opposition supporters took to the streets touting placards with the ominous slogan, "The hour has come".

Under mounting pressure, President Kaunda repealed the one-party act and made Zambia a multi-party state. The Zambian people turned out in droves to cast their vote, some districts even erecting makeshift polling stations beneath trees where there was no infrastructure. UNIP lost the elections, and thus, democracy in Zambia was reborn.



#### 1993 Zambia's World Cup Contending Team Dies in Plane Crash - Gone but Not Forgotten

On 27th April 1993, a flight carrying one of Zambia's most promising national teams and their management to a FIFA World Cup Qualifier against Senegal in Dakar crashed into the Atlantic Ocean about 500 metres offshore from Libreville, Gabon, after a refuelling stop.

The tragedy sent shockwaves through the country, and the fallen heroes were buried at a state funeral. 19 years later, in 2012, Kalusha Bwalya, a member of the original team and a new Zambian team, raised the AFCON cup in the country where his former teammates perished in the disaster. Thirty years on, Zambia still commemorates the team to this day.

#### 2012 Zambia Wins AFCON Cup - A Jubilation Like No Other

In February 2012, Africans gathered at the Stade d'Angondjé in Libreville, Gabon, to witness the Africa Cup of Nations (AFCON) final between Zambia and Ivory Coast. Underestimated and seemingly inexperienced, Zambia became the underdog, defeating the third-time finalists in a tense penalty shootout, leading to Zambia's first continental title. The win was dedicated to the fallen heroes of the 1993 Gabon plane crash, a full circle moment.

#### 2015 Zambia's First Female Vice President - A Progressive Decision

On 26th January 2015, 51 years after independence, Inonge Wina was appointed Vice President of Zambia, becoming the first woman to be elected Vice President. As president of the Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA), Mrs Wina promoted various women's human rights agendas in Zambia. Previously married to the late freedom fighter Arthur Wina, Mrs Wina upheld the vision she shared with her husband and instrumented great change in her way.







#### 2023 A Booming Hub for Art, Music, Tourism and SMEs - An Unstoppable Zambia

Today, Zambia is a sought-after tourism destination, and technological innovation is all around. Artists like Sampa the Great have put Zambia on the map and are reviving Zamrock for future generations. Zambia also made its first FIFA Women's World Cup appearance in 2023. 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# **STANDING** the **TEST** of **TIME** Zambia's Historical Sites

With the sun shining and temperatures rising, it's clear that summer has begun in Zambia, setting the stage for exciting adventures. This country is full of contrasts, making it the perfect destination for wildlife enthusiasts and thrill-seekers alike. But don't forget the abundance of heritage tourism sites waiting to be explored. As you travel throughout the country, whether for pleasure or work, keep an eye out for these historical landmarks - you might be surprised at how close they are to you.

I have a lot of experience with long road trips, but this particular journey promised to be unlike any other. Suppose, like me, you're embarking on a trek from the southernmost point of the country all the way up to the northernmost tip (with some interesting detours along the way). In that case, I highly recommend starting in Livingstone -Zambia's renowned tourism capital.







When in Livingstone, stop by the Livingstone Railway Museum to see the various trains and passenger cabins used by Rhodesia Railway (RR) and Zambezi Sawmills Railway (ZSR) in Zambia's early industrial years. The museum showcases the locomotives used to transport people and timber, from different parts of the country to other regions beyond Rhodesia's borders.

During my visit, my knowledgeable guide excitedly informed me of the history of the railway operation in this region and provided insight into Cecil J Rhodes' dream of a Cape to Cairo railway. He guided me to the site of the oldest locomotive in Zambia, No. 955, which was built in the late 1800s and acquired by the Zambezi Sawmills Railway in 1966. I left the museum brimming with knowledge, and I highly recommend the stop when in Livingstone.

As you head to Lusaka from Livingstone, consider taking a detour at the Chikankata turnoff and visit the Chirundu Fossil Forest located within the Zambezi Valley of the Lusaka province, a short distance from the Siavonga turnoff along the road to Chirundu, one of Zambia and Zimbabwe's mutual border towns.

With a history dating back 150 million years, the fossil forest is an extraordinary paleontological treasure. It hosts a remarkable collection of fossilised coniferous trees, which, over time, transformed into stone. The fossils are scattered on either side of the road, accessible via unmarked footpaths, a five to ten-minute stroll from the road. Keep an eye out for the monument site marker along the road, for the kind locals often come to the aid of curious visitors lingering nearby. Their assistance proved invaluable as they guided us to these extraordinary sites, where I marvelled at the tree remnants, now seamlessly integrated into the stony landscape.

The drive back to Lusaka is dotted with captivating vistas and noteworthy landmarks. Amidst these well-known sights, there exists a gem so deeply woven into the city's essence that it quietly blends into the background. One such landmark is Freedom House, located within the central business



district of Lusaka at the corner of Freedom Way and Chiparamba Road. Largely concealed by retail shops and posters, one could easily overlook the historical significance of this unassuming



location. Yet, it holds great importance as the former headquarters of the United National Independence Party (UNIP) during the campaign for Zambia's freedom.

It also served as a crucial base for the freedom fighters and activists who passionately advocated for the independence of other Southern African countries. Today, the exterior of the building still bears the branding of UNIP, as the party still has a presence in this building.

Take a short drive from Freedom House to Lusaka's Kamwala area to visit the Freedom Statue before the Government Complex. It was erected in 1974 and unveiled during Zambia's 10th independence anniversary. The monument immortalises the defiance and strength of Zanco Mpundu Mutembo, who was arrested and held in chains for protesting during the height of the struggle. Zanco was ordered to break free from his chains or be shot, and in that defining moment, he mustered all his strength and broke free of his shackles.

This single feat of strength has been etched into Zambia's history and is







depicted on all its national currency notes. While the statue is the monument's highlight, the base of the statue contains several art installations which depict moments of protest, leaders at Chisokone market and jubilation of the people. The heritage site is the focal point of Zambia's independence celebrations on October 24th and Africa Day, which falls on May 25th, and you can access it for free year round.

It would be a glaring oversight to mention the Freedom House without mentioning Dr Kenneth Kaunda, the



country's founding father. Nestled in the heart of Chilenje lies House 394. While the entire area of Chilenje was home to several freedom financers and freedom fighters, House 394 is where Dr Kenneth Kaunda lived from January 1960 to December 1962 and served as a base for directing the collective efforts towards Zambia's independence.

The museum site was commissioned as a national monument on the advent of Zambia's fourth independence anniversary in 1968, and in 2011 a copper statue of Dr Kaunda was unveiled to commemorate his 87th birthday. The museum-cum-monument beautifully depicts the family life of Dr Kaunda, showcasing original furniture and personal effects of the Kaunda family.

One particularly noteworthy item among these personal effects is the Land Rover vehicle gifted to Dr Kaunda during the struggle, by a missionary named Marvin Temple. As you step into the courtyard on the premises, this iconic vehicle immediately catches your eye. This site is accessible most days of the week for a meagre entry fee, so a visit here is a no-brainer.

As you gallivant around the capital, consider a short stop to see the cooling tower that has graced Lusaka's skyline since the 1930s. The structure is a remnant of the thermal power plant established to provide coal-fired electricity to the then-growing city of Lusaka. Situated conveniently near the railway line, the plant received a steady flow of raw materials essential for generating electricity, thus playing a vital role in the city's industrialisation.

While the plant's operations were decommissioned in the 1970s, the cooling tower has remained one of Zambia's historical landmarks and is worth learning about. Although the cooling tower is no longer accessible to visitors, you can get a close-up view from the Levy Shopping Mall.



Traverse north, exploring Zambia's numerous waterfalls along the way as you venture toward the apex of the Northern Province to dip in the crystal blue waters of Lake Tanganyika. While there, take a leisurely stroll around Zambia's oldest surviving stone church. The Niamkolo Church was built by missionaries who journeyed to presentday Mpulungu. Initially used by the missionaries as a place of worship until 1908, it was abandoned when they moved the mission post inland to avoid the sleeping sickness carried by tsetse flies near Lake Tanganyika.

Though the church now stands in ruins, the remnants still evoke a sense of wonder as it has withstood the test of time for over 120 years. While visitors cannot access the central part of the church, the exterior view provides a gratifying glimpse into its rich and storied past.

As your journey comes to a close, consider one last detour through the breathtaking South Luangwa National Park before heading back to Lusaka. Head east to visit the 'Rumpelstiltskin House' in Lundazi, on the northern end of the province near Malawi.

The fascinating tale of Lundazi Castle Hotel begins between 1948 and 1952 when Mr Errol Button, the British District Commissioner, constructed a rest house. The purpose was to offer accommodation to visitors arriving in the valley and plateau surrounding the present-day town of Lundazi. As the legend goes, Mr Button sketched a rough outline of the building he envisioned on a humble cigarette box. This unique design was inspired by the pointed-arch Norman castles of Scotland, which were the height of fashion in the early 1900s.

During my visit to the hotel, I had the privilege of exploring the room that once hosted notable figures such as Dr Kenneth Kaunda and Queen Elizabeth during their visits to Lundazi. The room stands as a testament to history, adorned with photographs capturing the presence of these two influential leaders in their respective eras.

Today, while Lundazi Castle Hotel may evoke the aura of a haunted house, it remains fully operational, offering 13 guest rooms to welcome visitors. If you dare to embrace the intrigue, spending a night within its storied walls would undoubtedly make for an unforgettable tale to share.

Countless heritage sites scattered throughout the country provide captivating glimpses into life from bygone decades, stitching together a narrative that illuminates our past and the forces that have shaped us into who we are today. ## FINDS REMEDIES FOR HUNGER IN RURAL ZAMBIA



ndrew Zimmern–awardwinning American chef, television host, and United Nations World Food Programme (WFP) Goodwill Ambassador–has travelled to more than 100 countries throughout his bizarre foods career and extensively throughout Africa. But his first visit to Zambia between March and April of 2023 left a lasting impression on him.

"This is my first mission trip as a Goodwill Ambassador for WFP, and it's my first time to Zambia, and I'm forever changed by it. You can't come into a country like this that is lifting itself up and not be incredibly moved, especially if you're someone who's been to so many African countries as I have," said Zimmern.

He chronicles his trip to the Southern Province in a five-episode YouTube series, Paving the Way to Zero Hunger, out now on Zimmern's YouTube channel. The series spotlights how climate change drives hunger in Zambia and the WFP resilience programs that enable smallscale farmers to adapt to climate change by adopting climate-smart agriculture, diversifying crops and their income streams and strengthening their overall food security.

In introducing the viewer to the series, Zimmern highlights an innovative, pupil-managed hydroponics garden at Gwembe Primary School, where students learn and grow fresh, diverse vegetables



to enhance their school meals. This is one of 72 hydroponic gardens that WFP has helped establish across Zambia. Not only does the garden help teach science and provide balanced meals for its 1,300 pupils, but the excess vegetables are shared with the local community. The goal is to provide a model of how any community or household can supplement their diet through these lowcost and limited-water techniques. Many Gwembe students are teaching their parents sack farming and hydroponic techniques, transforming how their parents, many of whom are farmers, grow food.



Zimmern then meets with Monze farmer Emeldah who is part of a WFPsupported financial literacy group called Savings for Change. These innovative savings groups function like a savings and loan mechanism, supporting and educating farmers, many of them women, in saving, investing, and growing their income streams. Over time, as the participants' financial literacy grows, WFP is able to link these groups to private financial institutions for even greater lending opportunities.

In the last episode, we meet Gwembe farmer Priscilla. She has worked with WFP to implement climate-smart, conservation agricultural methods that allow her to diversify her crops and conserve water during the dry season. Despite a failed rainy season and un-harvestable cowpea crop this year, Priscilla can rely on her alternative crops of sorghum, sunflower, groundnuts, and maize to feed her family and sell at the market. With conservation farming, she's increased her yield from 40 to 60 bags and has been trained to use air-tight storage bags to avoid post-harvest loss.

Since 1967, WFP has been a strategic partner to the Zambian government in an effort to build government capacity and work toward food security for all. WFP's programs in Zambia include food assistance and nutrition services, skills training and support to smallholder farmers as well as supporting the implementation of homegrown school

meal programs. WFP prioritises its support for women farmers, whom they view as crucial drivers of change. 90 per cent of the country's food is produced by smallholder farmers, of which 50.4 per cent are women, who often have less access than men to agricultural inputs.

Zimmern was deeply inspired by the solutions he saw that are helping families and creating real change for local communities. "The work that WFP is doing here is absolutely staggering. Taking small programs, small gestures, like the grain aggregators, like the nutrition programs in schools, like the hydroponic gardens, like the Savings for Change programs that we saw...all those things are small gestures that can then be scaled up and literally change the face of a country in just a handful of years. And if it can work in Zambia, it can also work in other countries," said Zimmern.

In his role as WFP Goodwill Ambassador, Zimmern leverages his platform to raise awareness of WFP's mission to end global hunger and to galvanise American support and funding for the organisation. Inspired by his experience in Zambia, he also supports further American investment in Zambia.

"When you wonder why invest in a country like Zambia, well, it's kind of obvious to me. The people are eager, have an incredible amount of pride, and see the opportunities for economic development and to be the breadbasket for the eight nations surrounding them. And as importantly, the incredible families, women, and students that we met all want to implement these programs in their communities and homes and spread the gospel of change far and wide because it's working for them," said Zimmern.

#### **BAGGAGE ALLOWANCE**

- In addition to the carry on luggage allowance provided herein, each passenger may carry without additional charge, the following carry on items the weight of which shall not exceed 5kg. The carry on items are permitted for use during the flight and when retained in the passengers' custody as listed here below:
- A lady handbag, pocket book or purse, which is appropriate to normal traveling dress and is not being used as a container for the transportation of articles, which would otherwise be regarded as baggage.
